- 13 That said, Yasser, would you come
- 14 forward please, state your name and spell your last
- 15 name and be sworn.
- 16 MR. ABDELKADER: Thank you. Good
- 17 evening. My name is Yasser Abdelkader. A, as in
- 18 apple, B, as in boy, D-E-L-K-A-D-E-R, Barrington
- 19 Drive, Bridgewater.
- MR. COLLINS: Please raise your right
- 21 hand. Do you swear or affirm to tell the truth, the
- 22 whole truth and nothing but the truth so help you
- 23 God?
- MR. ABDELKADER: I do. Thank you.
- MS. TUBMAN: Would you start by telling

- 1 public, thank you very much for giving me the chance
- 2 to speak today -- tonight before you and to
- 3 basically discuss our application with you. This is
- 4 obviously a process that we're all aware started
- 5 roughly three years ago, maybe a little longer than
- 6 that. Obviously, the search predates me even moving
- 7 to Bridgewater.
- 8 I'd like to start just by briefly
- 9 explaining our religion in Islam. We have five
- 10 prayers a day, and in our religion, prayer is pretty
- 11 much the most sacred pillar of our faith and our
- 12 religion. I can sit here and probably, you know,
- 13 cite hundreds of verses that talk about the
- 14 importance of prayer and the importance of building
- 15 houses of worship to establish prayer because it's a
- 16 very, very crucial and critical part of our
- 17 existence and our believe.
- When people move to a certain area,
- 19 essentially, one of the primary things is to first
- 20 establish a mosque, to build a mosque, because
- 21 that's where prayer is held. That's the spiritual
- 22 home for the community. This is the place where
- 23 people congregate, get together and worship.
- Let's see. We've been pretty much
- 25 representing space since we -- since we've been here

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- 1 the board and the audience your position with the
- 2 Alfalah Center?
- 3 MR. ABDELKADER: Sure. I'm the
- 4 president of the board of Alfalah Center. I've been
- 5 the president since -- actually, if you don't mind,
- 6 I'm going to turn this a little bit this way so I'm
- 7 facing everybody.
- 8 I've been the president since Alfalah
- 9 board has been established a little over three years
- 10 ago.
- MS. TUBMAN: And you're charged this
- 12 evening by me to testify about the intended use of 13 the mosque?
- 14 MR. ABDELKADER: Correct.
- MS. TUBMAN: And would you just go into
- 16 your narrative?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Sure. Thank you.
- 18 MS. TUBMAN: And at the conclusion of
- 19 your testimony, you will be available for questions.
- 20 MR. ABDELKADER: Absolutely. Please
- 21 don't mind my voice. It's going to be coming in and
- 22 out because I've had like one week of like a sore
- 23 throat and the flu. So sorry about that.
- 24 Let's see. Mr. Chairman, board
- 25 members, Mr. Mayor, prospective members of the

- 1 in Bridgewater to basically have our prayers. Out
- 2 of the five prayers of the day, the midday prayer
- 3 which is roughly somewhere -- sometime between 1
- 4 p.m. and 1:30 p.m., and I'm saying roughly between
- 5 that time because we go by the lunar calendar and
- 6 the position of the sun in the sky and that shifts
- 7 during -- like depends on what time of the year,
- 8 what time of the year you're in or what period of
- 9 the year. So the midday prayer on Friday is pretty
- 10 much what the Friday prayer is where we actually
- 11 have a service and a sermon.
- Excuse me if I jump back and forth
- 13 between things. I'm just going to go through a few
- 14 things here. Okay. I'll just explain. Our morning
- 15 prayer is basically one hour before sunrise. That's
- 16 the first prayer of the day. The midday prayer is
- 17 one hour after high noon. That's basically the
- 18 midday prayer. The third prayer which is called
- 19 Asar is halfway between high noon and sunset. The
- 20 fourth prayer is at sunset, and the last prayer, the
- 21 fifth prayer of the day is two hours after sunset.
- Currently, we pray -- we perform these
- 23 prayers -- one very kind and generous member of the
- 24 community actually have donated an area in his place
- 25 of business for these prayers to be conducted, and

- 1 very roughly right now the morning prayer is roughly
- 2 five people, and the reason for that is obviously
- 3 the timing and because many people actually need to
- 4 be outside their house going to work when it's time
- 5 for that prayer. That's why the number is low, and
- 6 it's been that way for the last three years.
- Midday prayer which is one hour after
- 8 high noon, it's prayed around roughly 1:15 or 1:30
- 9 p.m. About 10 to 15 people show up for that prayer,
- 10 and that's because this prayer comes at a time where
- 11 people are at their job working. So, basically,
- 12 whatever place is closest to your business, that's
- 13 the place where you go to to conduct your prayer.
- 14 You're not necessarily tied or they're not a member
- 15 or married to a specific location that they have to
- 16 go to, just what the nearest location is.
- 17 The next prayer, the third prayer,
- 18 probably even less than that, about seven people.
- 19 The sunset prayer is about five people. The last
- 20 prayer of the day, Isha, which is two hours after
- 21 sunset, roughly no more than 10 people, somewhere
- 22 between five and 10 people, and these have been the
- 23 numbers consistently for the last three years. They
- 24 have not changed.
- 25 Friday prayer, this is pretty much the

- 1 first sermon and prayer was roughly 40 people, and
- 2 then over a period of five to six weeks it pretty
- 3 much like ramped up steadily until we hit 80, 85,
- 4 and that's where we've been for the last three
- 5 years, like somewhere between 85 and it spikes up to
- 6 maybe 110 depending on when Friday falls.
- 7 If Friday falls on a holiday or a day
- 8 that, you know, like most people have off, then you
- 9 see a little bit more higher-turnout because the
- 10 family comes because the kids have off from school
- 11 and like the family comes to the prayer together.
- So that's pretty much the numbers, and
- 13 I understand -- I have here the sheet from the --
- 14 from our application where it has the numbers, the
- 15 estimated numbers for the attendees, and I know the
- 16 Friday prayer says 250, and I just need to explain 17 that.
- 18 MS. TUBMAN: May I interrupt for just a
- 19 second?
- 20 MR. ABDELKADER: Sure.
- MS. TUBMAN: That document to which
- 22 Yasser is referring is in the application package,
- 23 but because it is buried in that package, I've had
- 24 it pre-marked as A-2, given a copy to your secretary
- 25 and the two attorneys here representing objectors.
- 1 Now you could continue.
- MR. ABDELKADER: Thank you very much.
- 3 Now just address that particular point. I know that
- 4 that sheet has the attendees estimate and it is
- 5 called an estimate. We have 250 people. If you
- 6 would indulge me, I'm known for analogies. So I'm
- 7 going to use the analogy very, very quickly.
- 8 Let's assume that the closing costs on
- 9 buying a house is a hundred thousand dollars. It's
- 10 a very, very significant initial investment when you
- 11 actually buy a house. That's the equivalent of
- 12 building a project like this one and building a
- 13 building like this one. There is a very, very
- 14 significant initial investment. When you're buying
- 15 a house, you don't buy a single bedroom house
- 16 knowing that you are going to get married and have
- 17 two kids in the next few years, and when you get
- 18 married, then you get two bedroom. You have one
- 18 married, then you get two bedroom. Tou have one
- 19 child. You sell that and upgrade to the next three
- 20 bedroom and so forth. That would be, you know, like
- 21 completely insufficient and unrealistic.
- So the number of 250, this is
- 23 accounting for many, many years down the road.
- 24 This is an estimate for where we see our
- 25 congregation and our community growing to the next

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1 most show up or turn out in a prayer, and that's

- 2 weekly on Friday, and it's -- it starts at 1 o'clock
- 3 and it ends about 1:45. It's roughly 45 minutes.
- 4 It's a sermon given by the Imam or someone who 5 actually gives the sermon followed by a prayer, and,
- 6 typically, people start arriving starting maybe 10
- 7 minutes to one, 10 to 1 p.m., and it's basically a
- 8 trickle. People start arriving over a period of 9 like about 35 minutes, and the prayer itself is
- 10 roughly 1:35, lasts about 10 minutes, and then
- 11 people start also leaving like in a trickle fashion,
- 12 because, you know, like people sometimes hang out
- 13 and talk for 10, 15 minutes. Some people perform
- 14 some extra prayers. So it's not everyone to the
- 15 door in one shot.
- We have been basically renting the
- 17 Green Knoll Firehouse hall next to the fire station
- 18 in Bridgewater for roughly two and a half, maybe --
- 19 actually close to three years. We just changed our
- 20 location from that to the Days Inn on Route 22 about
- 21 two and a half months ago, I would say maybe three 22 months ago.
- At the Green Knoll, just to give you an
- 24 idea when we started, obviously, because it's a new
- 25 location and not many people knew about it, our

- 1 50 years. It doesn't mean that we have 250 showing
- 2 up today for the Friday prayer right now. We're
- 3 about somewhere between 90 and 100, and we haven't
- 4 been not much change for the last three years. Of
- 5 those attendees, typically, you would find 90
- 6 percent men and 10 percent women. There's a reason
- 7 for that.
- 8 The reason is that women are not
- 9 required to attend the Friday sermon and prayer.
- 10 They're not required, you know, religiously to be
- 11 there. Obviously, there's a wisdom behind this.
- 12 There are young children that need to be taken care
- 13 of. There are many other matters that they attend
- 14 to. Actually, I consider I have it easy. I have a
- 15 job, I go to work and I just do my work and come
- 16 back home. You know, mothers and wives, they have a
- tougher job. God bless them. So that's why they
- 18 are not required to go to prayer, and that's why the
- 19 numbers are low attendance for the Friday prayer,
- 20 and that's why also later on when I go through some
- 21 of our building you will notice that the area for
- 22 women is smaller, because from practice, from
- 23 experience, from life, we just know that the
- 24 attendance is 10 percent women, and that area
- 25 there's no hard wall.

- ving 1 MR. ABDELKADER; Okay. Sure. Thanks a
  - 2 lot. So that's the Friday prayer, and that's pretty
  - 3 much the highest number you'll see with the
  - 4 exception of two days, two days more out of year
  - 5 that I'm going to explain shortly.
  - Ramadhan, and that's R-A-M-A-D-H-A-N,
  - 7 this is our one month, one holy month in the year
  - 8 where we do our fasting and we do extra worship and
  - 9 extra prayers, and we have actually additional
  - 10 prayers that we do in the evening, and that's again
  - 11 one month -- 29 or 30 days out of the year, and
  - 12 it -- there's no set -- it shifts.
  - 13 The Islamic calendar is a lunar
  - 14 calendar. So the lunar year is 11 days shorter than
  - 15 a standard Georgian year. So that month pretty much
  - 16 comes 11 days earlier every single year. Actually,
  - 17 30 years ago or roughly 24 years ago. It's the same
  - 18 time it's going to come this year. It's just pretty
  - 19 much circled around. It took about 25 or 30 years
  - 20 to circle around. Like sometimes it comes in
  - 21 January. Sometimes it comes in February and so
  - 22 forth. You understand.
  - 23 So during that month, we fast, and our
  - 24 fasting basically means refraining from any food or
  - 25 drink from sunrise, from dawn to sunset. No eating,

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- 1 It's just simply an area that's
- 2 designated for women, and I mean, if the number is
- 3 higher, they just simply move forward. It's an open
- 4 area and it's dynamic. Also, while up here, the
- 5 reason why the women's area is in the back, we don't
- 6 have commingling and mixing during service and
- 7 during worship between women and men. That's why8 women sit separately, and the reason they sit in the
- 9 back, I'm not sure how many people are familiar with
- 10 the prayer like in Islam, but we bow and we kneel
- 11 and we prostrate and we're completely down on our
- 12 hands and knees on the floor, obviously, you know,
- 13 to god.
- Just common sense, I don't think any
- 15 women is going to want to be in the front doing that
- 16 and men behind her. That's why women are in the
- 17 back, out of respect, out of respect to their
- 18 integrity and out of like privacy.
- Okay. Moving forward, if you don't
- 20 mind, just a question, do you want me to pause for
- 21 any questions about the Friday prayer or keep the
- 22 questions at the end?
- MS. TUBMAN: Keep your testimony and
- 24 leave the questions to the end because some of them
- 25 may be answered in the course of your testimony.

- 1 no drinking, no smoking for smokers. We're not
- 2 supposed to be smoking period anyway, and in the3 evening, after the last prayer in the day which
- 4 comes two hours after sunset, we go back to the
- 5 mosque, and we perform what's called Tarawweh
- 6 prayer, T-A-R-A-W-W-E-H, prayers, and, basically,
- o prayor, i i i i i i i i prayoro, and, oublean
- 7 those are extra prayers that people perform during8 Ramadhan following the teaching of our profit
- 9 Muhammad, and, basically, the best way to describe
- 10 it and the easiest way to describe it, when I
  11 describe people, it's extra credit pretty much.
- So you basically getting extra credit,
- 13 extra points. You're doing extra worship, and among
- 14 many, many other things, I'm not about obviously to
- 15 give any crash course about our religion and our
- 16 practices, but there are many other things that we
- 17 do as part of, you know, the worship and the fasting
- 18 that we do during Ramadhan. So that prayer, again,
- 19 like I said, it starts after the last prayer of the
- 20 day. It starts two hours after sunset and, again,
- 21 the sheet that Ms. Lloyd Tubman referred to with the
- numbers and the estimates that we -- that we have in our application states that there's about 150 people
- 24 show up for that prayer which is roughly between
- 8:30 p.m. and 10:30 p.m., give or take, and it

1 shifts a little bit because of the lunar as I

- 2 explained. That's 150 in the application, but the
- 3 numbers we have seen consistently over the last
- 4 three years is -- it starts -- and I explained this.
- 5 It's kind of funny.
- 6 It starts with about 60, 60 to 70
- 7 people, and then midway, because there are
- 8 options -- you know, I mean some people perform
- 9 eight prayers. Some people would like to perform
- 10 16. Some people perform 20. So it just dwindles
- 11 down. By the middle of the duration of the prayer,
- 12 which is like after the first hour, we're pretty
- much down to 20 people, from 70 to about 20 people,
- 14 you know, halfway through the evening, and all it is
- 15 is simply, you know, like an Imam leading the
- 16 prayer, reciting verses from our holy book, the
- 17 Quran, and people are standing in rows behind them
- 18 and just perform prayer, one prayer after another.
- We obviously take many breaks in the
- 20 middle. Breaks for people to rest, to have a drink
- 21 of water. We might have a small five- to 10-minute
- 22 what we call like a mini lecture, religiously --
- 23 obviously, religiously inclined. That's the
- 24 Tarawweh prayer which we perform in Ramadhan, and,
- 25 typically, this is a family -- this is all about

- 1 we perform the prayer first and then we have the
- 2 sermon. That's the only difference.
- 3 I mean the Friday prayer you have the
- sermon first and then the prayer at the end. You
- 5 pray first and then you have the sermon, and it's
- 6 roughly 45 minutes, but it's typically longer than
- 7 that in terms of, after the prayer, people start
- 8 talking, and like most people -- I don't want to
- 9 quote percentages or make a guess, but my guess
- would be like 70 percent of the people, if not more, it would be 80 percent of people take off that day,
- to take the day off from your They come with their
- 12 take the day off from work. They come with their
- 13 family and they just socialize.
- It's an occasion that you see friends.
- 15 Sometimes you see people that you pretty much see
- 16 once a year on that occasion that may be visiting
- 17 their family from a far distance and so forth. So
- 18 people gather and they socialize, usually have like
- 19 muffins and bagels and orange juice and coffee and
- 20 so forth, and that lasts maybe for an hour, hour and
- 21 a half, and during that hour, again, people just
- 22 simply leave in a trickle manner.
- You know, like maybe after the sermon
- 24 is done, the few who have to go to work didn't take
- 25 the day off, but the vast majority, 85 percent of

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- 1 family being together and family worshipping
- 2 together and people gathering together.
- 3 So those -- the number of people that
- 4 are there actually account for much more number of
- 5 cars. We can come to that later.
- 6 Next that I wanted to explain is our
- 7 Eid, E-I-D, prayer. We have two major holidays or
- 8 major holy days in the year. One of them is Eid
- 9 al-Fitr. If you want me to spell it,
- 10 E-I-D-A-L-F-I-T-R. That celebration or that
- 11 occasion comes at the end of Ramadhan, after the
- 12 last day of Ramadhan. Basically, it's a way to
- 13 celebrate, to, you know, end the month of fasting.
- 14 It's kind of actually mixed emotions, because, you
- 15 know, we love that month and we love that. It's
- 16 here and we enjoy it, and it is -- you know, it's a
- 17 celebration, but at the same time, we hate to see
- 18 the month end, but in any case, Eid prayers is
- 19 typically performed 9 or 9:30 a.m.
- o Sometimes I mean people can actually
- 21 perform it or hold it earlier than that, but because
- 22 of business and work and work hours and traffic and
- 23 so forth, we always opt to hold it at 9:30, 9:30 in
- 24 the morning, and it lasts roughly 45 minutes similar
- 25 to the Friday prayer. The only difference is that

- 1 people will be there for a good hour, hour and a
- 2 half, and they'll just trickle out, you know, very
- 3 slowly. That's Eid al-Fitr.
- 4 The second major religious holiday of
- 5 the year is Eid al-Adha, A-D-H-A, I believe. Okay.
- 6 And that comes -- that actually comes at like
- 7 towards the end of the timing of our pilgrimmage,
- 8 the holy pilgrimmage that people go to Mecca. You
- 9 know, towards like the last few days, that's the
- 10 timing of where that holiday is, and it is typically
- 11 roughly two months and 10 days after the first
- 12 holiday.
- Those are pretty much the only two
- 14 major holidays that we have period, and I
- 15 understand, again, in the application document where
- 16 we have the attendance estimate, we have 500. So
- 17 far we have probably not exceeded 300, and that's
- 18 been consistent also in the last three years.
- 19 Similar to Friday prayers, we need to
- 20 find space to rent to perform, to have that done, 21 and we've rented various, you know, different,
- 22 different places, the Days Inn, schools like the
- 23 auditorium -- not auditorium, the gymnasium of
- 24 schools. We've actually rented Redwood Inn itself
- 25 about four or five times when it was still in

- Let's see. So, actually, just to put
- 3 things in perspective, the number of cars that show
- 4 up for the Eid prayer, even though it's 300 people,
- 5 is typically much less than the Friday prayer
- 6 because you have families. You have four or five
- people per car.
- Okay. So this covers all the prayers,
- worship, that, you know, area of the document that
- 10 I'm looking at, and I'm just trying to cover
- 11 everything as much as I can.
- Okay. Aside from the five prayers and 12
- the Friday prayer and the Eid prayer, the rest of
- the services that we hope to provide is basically
- 15 Saturday and Sunday Islamic classes or Islamic
- 16 school. These are basically no different than
- Sunday classes, you know, at the church or at the
- 18 synagogue where, you know, families would like their
- 19 children to learn their heritage and to learn their
- 20 religion and basically take the children on the
- 21 weekend to learn from mostly volunteers. Most of
- 22 the teachers would be volunteers. Some are paid.
- 23 It doesn't really matter. Whatever the need is, we
- 24 provide that.
- Right now we have our Sunday school at 25

- 2 a separate location, and that's the same location
- 3 we're actually performing now five daily prayers.
- 4 Hopefully, that's also going to continue to be
- provided, and that is about 10, 12 children and two
- of them actually occasionally show up. So it's
  - about 10 to 12 children.
- Youth activities, that's something else
- that we would like and hope to provide. Youth
- 10 activities could be anything from a bunch of high
- 11 school children, maybe, I don't know, half a dozen
- 12 to a dozen, getting together and tutoring each 13 other, helping each other in classes, playing chess,
- 14 playing ping pong, having extra curricular
- 15 activities, small projects, community services, you
- 16 know, provide community service to the community,
- 17 organizing different -- different activities among
- 18 themselves.
- Senior citizen services, and that's 19
- 20 basically, again, providing service to the elderly,
- 21 whatever the need is, anybody who needs company,
- 22 needs someone to do their shopping, needs someone to
- 23 accompany them to certain locations whether for
- 24 translation or for carrying things. It's that kind
- 25 of services. I mean, just to simplify it, no

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- 1 the William Annin School in Basking Ridge. It's a
- 2 public school in Basking Ridge, and we have roughly
- 3 60 children, about eight classrooms that we rent
- 4 from the school. I believe that's been the extent 5 of it, and, typically, the ages range from five
- 6 years old to 12, maybe 14, and any higher than that,
- 7 the number dwindles significantly and becomes just
- 8 like a work group for the youth or the more adult
- So that's the Sunday -- Sunday class, 10
- 11 and, typically, it's a drop off and pick up. It
- 12 starts about 10 or 10:30 in the morning until 2:30
- 13 in the afternoon. Most parents -- a few parents
- 14 hang out and wait, you know, while -- they bring the
- 15 laptop. They bring their read -- you know, favorite
- 16 reading. They hang out together and socialize, but
- 17 the vast majority, I'll say 90 percent of parents
- 18 will drop off their kids and pick them up at the end
- 19 of the classes.
- Let's see. We also -- right now we
- 21 have also a separate much smaller class, 10
- 22 students, that actually work primarily mostly on
- 23 memorization, memorizing the Quran, our holy book,
- 24 and not just memorizing, obviously, learning the
- 25 meanings, learning all the background and what we

- 1 different than what any church or any synagogue
- 2 would provide, the community service that you would
- 3 provide to your community.
- Funeral and burial services, right now
- we don't have that. Obviously, we'd like it. We
- 6 rely on other established mosques or Islamic centers
- to provide it for us, and it is -- it's typically
- 8 just like, you know -- it's typically an emergency
- 9 situation because we don't have services. So you
- 10 have to rely on other people and other locations to
- 11 provide the service. We try to do the best we can.
- 12 Sister activity program, that's one of
- 13 the services also that's listed. That's just simply
- 14 the adult version of the youth program. It's
- 15 basically ladies getting together to discuss family
- 16 matters, raising children, school activities, school
- 17 homework, cooking, you name it, basically in small
- 18 groups, and right now, unfortunately, it doesn't
- exist or it's very, very limited or it's out of
- 20 someone's house, very small groups. It doesn't --
- 21 it's not going to be anything more than that, and,
- 22 typically, these things are provided by people
- 23 volunteering their time.
- 24 For example, we have a wonderful, you
- 25 know, pediatrician in the community. She would

- 1 maybe provide a -- you know, offer a session to
- 2 counsel mothers or to answer any questions about
- 3 children. We have a nutritionist in the community.
- 4 She would probably like announce and hold a session
- 5 to help people on how to lead a healthy life and a
- 6 healthy diet and so forth. Same thing would go, you
- 7 know, like if there's like a lawyer in the
- 8 community. He might hold a session to educate
- people about estate and legal matters and taxes and 10 so forth.
- Matrimonial services, that's
- 12 basically -- there are two aspects to that,
- basically, actually providing a safe and religiously
- approved environment for prospective young men and
- women who are at the age of getting married to meet,
- 16 to get to know each other and to talk, to discuss --
- to be basically introduced, and the other thing also
- 18 is that, when we have an Imam, like a resident Imam
- at a mosque, then he would provide guidance and
- 20 classes to teach the prospective husband and wife
- what are the rights and duties of a husband and wife
- 22 and so forth and what the nature of marriage life is
- 23 and what is the religiously correct way of leading
- 24 your life and so forth. Counseling services, that's
- 25 counseling services.

- - 1 community are more than welcome to always come. If
  - 2 they have questions, they want to learn more, if
  - 3 they want anything, any of these services are
  - available for everybody.
  - So back to the medical clinic. So,
  - 6 basically, a physician from the community would
  - 7 basically hold a clinic to educate people on
  - whatever it is that they need to learn about.
  - Whether it's, you know, they have a question about
  - 10 their high cholesterol, high blood pressure, their
  - 11 posture when they're sitting. I wake up and my back
  - 12 hurts. That's me talking. So, basically, that's
  - 13 basically the type of services that it would be.
  - Let's see. Let's do the paper shuffle.
  - 15 I'm just trying to look through to see if I covered
  - 16 most of the things that are in the services that we
  - provide list and that I'd like to cover.
  - Okay. I'm going to move on to the
  - 19 daycare. Basically, again, nothing different than
  - 20 what any daycare and any of the churches or the
  - 21 synagogues that are in Bridgewater. We plan to
  - 22 provide, you know, a daycare service for the public,
  - 23 for anybody, and I believe we have, my apologies, 40
  - 24 children. That's, you know, the number that we have
  - 25 to state or foresee, and it's going to be a range,

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- Community service program is like a
- 2 medical clinic. I think I pretty much touched on
- 3 that before where I mean like a physician in the
- 4 community would volunteer its time to hold -- to
- 5 hold sessions where anybody -- by the way, I
- 6 apologize. I need to step back and correct
- 7 everything that I said.
- Whoever is providing the session is
- 9 going to provide it based on the need of whoever
- 10 attends. I don't want to make it sound that these
- 11 services are provided for our community only and for
- 12 Muslims only. This is open for anybody and
- 13 everybody, and when I say that, you know, the Imam
- 14 would counsel the prospective, you know, husband and
- 15 wife how to lead their life religiously, that's when
- 16 they are Muslim, but the same exact service and all
- 17 of these services, it's a community center. It's
- 18 open for anybody and everybody in the community
- 19 similar to the daycare.
- The daycare, in which I'm going to talk
- 21 about there, it is open for the public, for anybody,
- 22 and we always welcome -- I have been to dozens of
- churches and for various occasions for various
- 24 events, and I expect -- and I've been to synagogues
- 25 as well, and I expect fully that any member of the

- 1 obviously, from infants to six years old. I guess
- 2 the time when they actually start going to public
- school. That would be my guess. There might be
- some provided aftercare or additional help, whatever
- 5 is needed, and it's going to be provided in the
- classrooms or the rooms that you see to the -- well,
- maybe this is a good time to go through this.
- Okay. This is the layout of the -- you
- 9 know, hopefully, the proposed layout of the Alfalah
- 10 Center, the current Redwood Inn as it right now.
- 11 I'm sure many of you are familiar with the building
- 12 and familiar with how it is laid out.
- 13 Basically, you have Mountaintop Road
- 14 running right here. So this is the front of the
- 15 building. Obviously, Mountaintop Road is about 50,
- 16 maybe 70 feet from this point. This is the main
- 17 entrance to the building, and there's going to be a
- 18 second entrance here with a ramp obviously for
- disabled. 19
- Right here, this is the primary or the 20
- 21 main prayer area. This is where we will basically
- 22 conduct our prayers whether it's the five prayers or
- 23 the Friday prayer or the Eid prayer. I would say
- probably for Eid we might need to remove these
- 25 dividers and have this space just for the Eid

- 1 prayer. This area is about 50 feet by 50 feet which
- 2 is gigantic for us. This is, you know, more than
- 3 what we need for probably -- I don't want to
- 4 speculate how many years, until my son is my age,
- 5 and, basically, this is the primary prayer area
- 6 right here.
- This is the area that's designated for
- 8 women, but, again, if there is more, basically,
- 9 they'll start going forward and like occupy however
- 10 much space that they need to occupy, and, you know,
- 11 we'll probably have very simple wooden, soft
- 12 dividers just for privacy, obviously, because when
- we are in the -- in our worship, we don't have
- 14 chairs. We do have, obviously, a few chairs for the
- 15 elderly, for someone with a bad back or a bad knee
- 16 or so forth, but for the most part, people sit on
- 17 the floor to listen to a sermon or to listen to a
- 18 lecture. So for privacy and since it's sitting on
- 19 the floor, we would have dividers here for the
- women's area. 20
- I mean I'm not sure how much in details 21
- you want me to go into. This is the main entrance.
- 23 This would be the lobby. You have the restrooms
- 24 here and another restroom here. So this would be
- 25 primarily for the ladies to perform ablution which

- 1 soon.
  - I think I'm done. Thank you very much.
  - I appreciate your patience, and thank you.
- CHAIRMAN RUSAK: Thank you. Are there 4
- any questions from the board?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Absolutely, of course.
- MR. MOENCH: Good evening, sir. I have
- a few questions that I want to go back over some of
- your testimony.
- MR, ABDELKADER: Yes.
- MR. MOENCH: The first, if I make sure 11
- 12 I understand, you mentioned numbers of attendees for
- prayer sessions. You mentioned one prayer session
- 14 is held currently at somebody's home, if I
- 15 understood, but then you also mentioned Green Knoll
- 16 Fire Department.
- 17 So I just wanted to understand what
- 18 locations you were talking about or is there
- 19 multiple locations? How is that currently working
- 20 now with your congregation?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Sure. It's not so 21
- 22 much home.
- 23 MR. MOENCH: I'm sorry. The business I
- 24 think you said.
- MR. ABDELKADER: At this business, this 25

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- 1 is like a ritual cleansing or washing before the
- 2 prayer. Most people would do that at home before
- 3 they even come in, but some people -- like if you're
- 4 coming from work or you're coming, you know, like
- 5 from a long drive, then you would need to do it
- 6 here.
- Right here, this is the entrance for
- 8 another long hallway that you see here and that way
- 9 as well. These are basically the classrooms. This
- 10 is a library, but these are all classrooms where we
- 11 would have our different activities, classrooms for
- 12 the daycare during the times that they're operating
- 13 or classes for breakout where we have youth
- 14 activity, a group of kids, you know, tutoring each
- 15 other, a group of women having like a lady's session
- 16 and so forth.
- 17 This is -- I believe this is just an
- 18 office with its own private bathroom. These are
- multi-purpose room, and also from the hallway here,
- there are two multi-purpose room and a third one.
- 21 Again, these can be for larger classes or for larger
- 22 groups. This is the electric room, and that's
- 23 pretty much it, and I'll leave the rest for
- 24 questions, I guess, if you have any questions about
- 25 any of that after I'm done which is going to be very

- 1 is a small room where we actually perform the five
- 2 daily prayers, the five prayers that I explained
- 3 which is at dawn and then roughly midday and then a
- 4 couple hours later and then at sunset and then two
- 5 hours after sunset. Those daily prayers are
- 6 required on a daily basis every single day. There's
- a special -- you know, a special prayer. What
- 8 happens is that that midday prayer on Fridays only,
- 9 that's where we have the Friday prayer that's going
- to be a larger number. That's roughly between 1 and 10
- 1:45 or 1:10 and five minutes to two in the 11
- 12 afternoon. That is what we rented the Green Knoll
- 13 for. That's for the Friday prayer. That's where
- 14 the number is roughly like around 90 or so. MR, MOENCH: Okay. You mentioned a
- 15 16 number before that was you said roughly 10 percent
- 17 of attendees on a Friday mass are women and then the 18 other 90 percent are the males.
- MR. ABDELKADER: Correct. 19
- MR. MOENCH: One of my concerns or 20
- 21 questions when I look at the activity sheet that
- 22 we've gone over and the estimated attendees and the
- estimated parking, and then, of course, the
- estimated spaces, required spaces, first of all, I
- 25 understand that your numbers right now are all lower

- 1 than what's projected here. I also appreciate the
- 2 fact that, of course, you hope to grow by having a
- 3 location and you hope to grow it which I fully
- 4 understand, but looking at these numbers that you
- 5 provided, looking at the Friday prayer where it has
- 6 estimated attendees of 250 and estimated parking of
- 7 150 cars --
- 8 MR. ABDELKADER: Right.
- 9 MR. MOENCH: -- when I do my rough math
- 10 that I scribble down here, if 10 percent of the
- 11 attendees were women, and I'm assuming that if those
- 12 women are coming as couples with their husband, I
- 13 get a total parking of roughly 225 spots. By doing
- 14 that, I'm assuming that every male is coming on his
- 15 own and then the women are coming with a couple. I
- 16 understand that that's -- we're estimating here that
- 17 some of the women may come on their own. Likewise,
- 18 some of the men may come together.
- So my concern is that the parking,
- 20 especially for the Friday prayers, is not matching
- 21 up. The ordinance that we have or the requirements,
- 22 one to three ratio is what we're using. The
- 23 estimates we have on this sheet are going to be
- 24 underestimating the actual number of cars that will
- 25 be there especially based on the 10 percent women

- 1 for about two years I went to the service with three
- 2 other guys. So there was four of us in the car.
- 3 I've seen many, many cars come in with two and three
- 4 males because they're at the same workplace
- 5 together.
- 6 The 10 percent women that I'm talking
- 7 about, 95 percent, you do the math, of them are
- 8 coming with their husbands as a family. So you have
- 9 a family of four and five coming in a minivan where
- 10 you have the husband and two teenagers and the wife
- and so forth. So of those women, my estimate is the majority of them are coming already in a car with
- 13 somebody else, and there are a lot of people that do
- 14 car pool because they're coming from the same place
- 15 of business.
- I mean, like I said, I used to go with
- 17 three other guys in one car, and I know four other
- 18 guys that also come together in one car, and I would
- 19 say half the cars -- I mean, I'm sorry, half the
- 20 cars that come there and come with more than one
- 21 person, not one person per car.
- What I can also tell you is, when we
- 23 were at the Green Knoll Fire Station, you know,
- 24 rental space, and I'm saying that we are roughly 90
- 25 people, the space parking in the Green Knoll and

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- 1 versus 90 percent men. So if you could respond to
- 2 that comment or question?
- 3 MS. TUBMAN: I cannot see who is
- 4 speaking. I apologize.
- 5 MR. MOENCH: I'm sorry. It's Matthew
- 6 Moench.
- MS. TUBMAN: Mr. Moench, this chart was
- 8 prepared by a group of laymen making guesses in
- 9 2010, 2011. The ITE manual has since come out with
- 10 some more on parking. We also have a parking expert
- 11 that can address your question as this witness is
- 12 unable to do.
- MR. MOENCH: Okay. Sir, based on just
- 14 your observations, I'm not asking you about any kind
- 15 of expert opinion on parking, but based on your
- 16 observations of who attends Friday mass, you gave
- 17 the estimate of 10 percent women.
- 18 Can you give any estimate with regard
- 19 to how many folks are coming, you know, car pooling
- 20 or coming as couples or coming as groups to the
- 21 Friday prayer as opposed to people who I assume are
- 22 coming from work, going back to work or coming from
- 23 home, going back to home? Do you have any visual
- 24 estimate on that?
- MR. ABDELKADER: What I can tell you is

- 1 the adjacent fire squad is no more than 50 cars, and
- 2 that was plenty for us. We never lose the street
- 3 parking except very, very rarely, again, on Fridays
- 4 that fall on a holiday or there's a major event or
- 5 so forth.
- 6 MR. MOENCH: Okay. With regard to the
- 7 daycare center, you estimated 40 children. How many
- 8 staff members would you expect to be serving those
- 9 40 children in the daycare center?
- 10 MR. ABDELKADER: Whatever the ratio by
- 11 law that is required to serve them. My -- I don't
- 12 know. Ten.
- MS. TUBMAN: Don't guess.
- MR. ABDELKADER: That's completely
- 15 guess on my part. My apology, but whatever the
- 16 ratio that's required by law for the ratio of
- 17 students to caregivers, that's what we'll be
- 18 servicing.
- MR. MOENCH: And same question for the
- 20 religious class you have. You estimated about 20
- 21 students on Saturday afternoon classes and 120
- 22 students on the Sunday classes.
- How are those classes proposed to be
- 24 broken up in terms of grade level or how many staff
- 25 come with that?

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- 1 I'm assuming that's volunteers when I
- 2 say staff, teachers. Do you have any estimate of
- 3 how that would propose to work?
- 4 MR. ABDELKADER: It is primarily --
- 5 it's an assessment at the beginning of each school
- 6 year, and we basically grade the students based on
- 7 like a reasonable mix or not mix -- a reasonable
- 8 ratio of their ability and their, you know, strength
- 9 in whatever area that they're learning as well as
- 10 their age. We have to also consider, you know,
- 11 their age.
- So if they're broken in that manner, I
- 13 can't tell you how many, you know, classes or
- 14 sessions we will have, but it probably would be no
- 15 more than eight -- eight or nine classes. That's
- 16 the amount of classes that we rent today for our
- 17 Sunday school.
- MR. MOENCH: Sure. On the sheet that
- 19 we were talking about that I have in front of me
- 20 that's been marked as an exhibit, it estimates for
- 21 the Sunday classes 120 students. It says 12 cars.
- Do you know where the 12 cars came
- 23 from?
- MR. ABDELKADER: That would pretty much
- 25 account for the staff and probably the principal and

- 1 Ramadhan falls in the summertime, I guess it would
  - 2 be 10:30 evening prayer, and then after that would
  - 3 occur, the evening Ramadhan prayers?
    - 4 MR. ABDELKADER: Correct, and just to,
  - 5 you know, explain a little bit more about that, for
  - 6 the last three years we also have been, you know,
  - 7 renting space. Our extremely, extremely generous
  - 8 and good friends at the Presbyterian church which is
  - 9 on the corner of Crim Road and Washington Valley
  - 10 Road, we've been using -- they were beyond generous
  - 11 and beyond supportive and they've hosted us to have
  - 12 our Tarawweh prayers during Ramadhan at their
  - 13 church.
  - We've been there for three years, the
  - 15 last three years. I don't think a single anybody or
  - 16 even knows that we exist or that we use that space
  - 17 because, again, you need to understand that it's a
  - 18 very, very slow trickle. It's -- you know, it's
  - 19 not -- it's not a lecture that starts on that time.
  - 20 People show up a little bit earlier to socialize.
  - 21 People show up a little bit earlier to do extra
  - 22 prayers and people show up late into the prayer
  - 23 itself. They arrive late because there are a lot of
  - 24 prayers that happen. You need to catch let's say 10
  - 25 prayers. You can catch them later on. You'll still

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- 1 a couple of administrators.
- MR. MOENCH: Okay.
- 3 MR. ABDELKADER: And that's what we see 4 again today.
- 5 MR. MOENCH: Okay. With regard to the
- 6 after sunset prayer --
- 7 MR. ABDELKADER: Yes, sir.
- 8 MR. MOENCH: -- that occurs two hours
- 9 after sunset. This may be a dumb question, but I
- 10 want to make sure I understand. So in the summer
- 11 times when sunset is at 8:30, does that mean the
- 12 prayer is at 10:30 at night?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Yes. Actually, I
- 14 apologize. Most -- the latest that it can be is
- 15 probably like 10:20 roughly.
- MR. MOENCH: So then in the summer
- 17 months it's later and in the winter months it's 8
- 18 o'clock?
- 19 MR. ABDELKADER: Yes.
- MR. MOENCH: Can you please remind me,
- 21 for the Ramadhan prayers, that's after -- that is
- 22 after the evening?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Immediately after it.
- 24 It follows immediately after it, yes.
- MR. MOENCH: So in which case, when

- 1 perform what you would like to perform. So there's
- 2 no big rush in and big rush out. It's a trickle
- з down.
- 4 Again, I mean I wish that -- you know,
- 5 that you would have joined us for any of our
- 6 services. It's all public knowledge. It's all
- 7 known and you can see what it is like. We've been
- 8 there for three years, not a complaint.
- 9 MR. MOENCH: For wedding ceremonies
- 10 that you would host at the center, can you give me
- 11 an understanding as to when those ceremonies
- 12 typically take place, Saturday afternoon? Is it a
- 13 Friday or Saturday evening? How long do those
- 14 ceremonies typically go?
- MR. ABDELKADER: It can be any time.
- 16 There is no particular set time for it that it need
- 17 to happen, but most people prefer to do it on a
- 18 Thursday evening or a Friday evening. Some will
- 19 hold it obviously -- when I say Thursday evening and
- 20 Friday evening, I need to explain a little bit that.
- 21 Back home -- well, my other home, because this is 22 home too. In the Middle East, our weekend is Friday
- 23 and Saturday. So Friday is a day off back in the
- 24 Middle East. So that's why Thursday evening and
- 25 Friday evening are convenient.

- Here people will probably do it on
- 2 Saturday and Sunday, and, typically, the ceremony
- 3 itself, the religious ceremony part of the marriage
- 4 is conducted where close -- very close, immediate
- 5 family and maybe a very few friends are present
- 6 before the Imam, and he does the, you know, do you
- 7 take that man, do you take that woman and so forth,
- and that's pretty much the extent of it.
- MR. MOENCH: How many children do you
- 10 typically get on the Friday prayer, Friday midday
- 11 prayer? I assume not many because it's in the
- 12 middle of the school day.
- MR. ABDELKADER: Yes. When school is 13
- 14 in session, you can probably count them on one hand.
- 15 When it's summertime, maybe a dozen, maybe between
- 16 like I would say a dozen or so, but most people are
- 17 mindful that this is a sermon and a service. So you
- 18 don't see many like infants or toddlers or kids
- 19 running around the place. Usually, you know, the
- youngest you would see is probably five or six who
- 21 are mature enough to sit down and actually sit
- 22 through a sermon.
- MR. MOENCH: There were questions at 23
- 24 one of the previous meetings about concerns about
- 25 how the outdoor space is going to be used,

- 1 slides, couple of swings for the children, and I
  - 2 haven't seen any place that take out all their kids
  - 3 at once. Usually, you take them out in batches, in
  - 4 classes, in groups, in controlled groups with the
  - children. You're not going to bring everybody out
  - 6 in one shot. That would be unrealistic, unsafe.
  - MR. MOENCH: Do you have any intention
  - or opinion about putting up some sort of fence
  - around the back of the property or barriers in order
  - 10 to keep either folks from walking in, from going off
  - 11 the property into neighbors' property or also to
  - 12 keep folks from being able to walk onto the property
  - while there's daycare students there?

  - Do you know if that's being proposed or
  - 15 have an opinion about doing something like that?
  - MS. TUBMAN: I believe our architect 16
  - 17 testified that there would be a fence around that
  - 18 play area in the back, and I believe it's shown on
  - 19 the architectural drawings.
  - MR. MOENCH: Okay. Thank you. Sir, 20
  - 21 just a few more questions, and I'm sure you'll get
  - 22 asked them from the public.
  - MR. ABDELKADER: As many as you want. 23
  - MR. MOENCH: So I will ask the first. 24
  - 25 When you give your numbers about your current

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- 1 especially if there's a playground in the back or
- 2 basketball court or some other outdoor facilities
- 3 for the children.
- Can you talk a little bit about what
- 5 the vision is right now for how the outdoor parts of
- 6 the property would be used?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Sure. In terms of --
- 8 in terms of religious services or what we need to do
- 9 for religious activities, we don't have anything
- 10 that's conducted outdoors. Our prayer space is
- indoors and we perform our prayers indoors. There
- 12 is no prayers performed outdoors. For the most
- 13 part, you'll find a few people like standing and
- 14 chatting after the service, and that's the extent of
- 15 it.
- 16 Obviously, for daycare, we'll have the
- 17 standard typical type playground, and it's -- I
- believe it is going to be placed somewhere around
- here behind the building. So this is the road.
- This will be the playground area, and that's
- 21 basically going to be -- again, like I drive by
- 22 every day a couple of times in front of the church
- on Van Holten Road. It's typical of what you see there or the church on Church Road in Bridgewater.
- It's a small playground, couple of

- 1 attendees with the 80 to 85 currently being the peak
- 2 on the Friday prayers and you -- and we have the
- 3 numbers here about the growth or what you expect to
- 4 see, where do you anticipate those -- those
- 5 attendees coming from in terms of serving the
- Bridgewater -- Bridgewater residents you anticipate
- or what kind of area do you expect that the center
- is going to be serving?
- MR. ABDELKADER: I don't anticipate to
- 10 see anything different than what we see now and what
- we've seen in the last three years that we've been
- 12 around. Basically, I mean you see -- you start
- 13 seeing -- you know all the faces. You know all the
- 14 people who come in, and you know pretty much who
- 15 lives around here and who works around here. We
- 16 have not -- we have not grown that much, if any,
- 17 like in the last three years.
- So, basically, if you work from home or 18
- 19 if you work in the area and happen to also live in
- 20 Bridgewater, you'll come and do your prayer then,
- 21 and for folks who work in the area but live-far,
- 22 this is the most convenient place and the most
- 23 realistic place for them to pray. I don't see it 24 changing a whole lot. I mean I don't want to
- 25 speculate.

- MR. MOENCH: One of the other questions
- 2 I'm sure you would get asked is where is the
- 3 nearest -- the next nearest mosque such as if you
- 4 didn't have this proposal and didn't build anything
- 5 in Bridgewater but wanted to attend a formal mosque,
- 6 rather than going to the Days Inn or Green Knoll
- 7 Grill -- Green Knoll Fire Department, where is that?
- 8 Where is the next center?
- MR. ABDELKADER: One of them is it's
- 10 called MC, MC which is Muslim Center of Somerset
- 11 County. I'm sorry. That's about 35 minutes -- 30
- 12 to 35 minutes southeast, but that's if they clear
- 13 the roads for you, if the roads are empty,
- 14 typically, you're talking about an hour.
- The other one that I can think of is
- 16 the Boonton Islamic Center North. Again, that's
- 17 probably 40 minutes when they clear the highway for
- 18 you and you're driving by yourself. I mean it takes
- 19 a lot longer, you know, and it's completely
- 20 unrealistic for the daily prayers or even for the
- 21 Friday prayers.
- MR. MOENCH: Sir, there was also
- 23 testimony at one of the previous meetings actually
- 24 in some depth about the size of the prayer mats.
- 25 Can you please provide some comment about -- and it

- 1 will have expert testimony on that.
- 2 MR. MOENCH: Okay. Thank you. Sir, I
- 3 think that's all my questions for now. I may have
- 4 more if I think of them, but for now that's it for
- 5 me.
- 6 MR. ABDELKADER: I'll stay here until
- 7 they kick me out of the building. I'll stay as long
- 8 as you want me and I'll answer any question.
- 9 MR. MOENCH: Thank you. I'm sure there
- 10 will be other folks that have questions for you.
- 11 MR. ABDELKADER: Absolutely, sure.
- 12 CHAIRMAN RUSAK: Anyone else?
- MR. CHARLES: Just a quick question.
- 14 Just what would your plans be if the lot fills, just
- 15 on a particular event you fill up? What's your plan16 B operationally?
- MR. ABDELKADER: For like for whatever
- 18 service?
- MR. CHARLES: Pick whatever service.
- 20 For some reason, the lot fills up. Is there
- 21 thinking from the board as to how to handle that?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Well, there are two
- 23 solutions for this. The first one is basically ask
- 24 to turn people away. Unfortunately, it has happened
- 25 and it does happen with our mosques.

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- 1 came up in the context of trying to calculate the
- 2 full occupancy of the room.
- 3 Can you give some testimony about the
- 4 size of a prayer mat or what the regulations are
- 5 typical?
- 6 MR. ABDELKADER: I had a mental note to
- 7 actually measure one at home before coming, but I
- 8 forgot. Two feet wide by two and a half -- I don't
- 9 want to guess.
- MR. MOENCH: Okay. Is it possible
- 11 or -- I'll ask your attorney. I know that came up
- 12 previously. If that's something that we could get
- 13 an answer on in terms of -- it came up in the
- 14 question of what's doctrine and what's not doctrine,
- 15 and the previous folks had said -- actually, I think
- 16 two of your experts may have actually had a
- 17 difference of opinion. Is that something we're able
- 18 to find out about?
- MS. TUBMAN: I think only one expert,
- 20 our architect, said he went on the Internet to find
- 21 a standard size, and you'll find that in the
- 22 transcript, and our engineer did not. He testified
- 23 that he took the 500 maximum that was given to him
- on this chart, applied your ordinance assuming three persons per vehicle, which is not the case, and we

- 1 We know what our capacity is. We know
- 2 what the maximum occupancy is and we will adhere to
- 3 that. We know -- we follow the rules and we
- 4 basically will turn people away.
- 5 The other option is to provide a second
- 6 service very exactly the same way on Christmas or
- 7 Easter or any of your major holidays in a church.
- 8 They provide a second and a third service, and that
- 9 completely alleviates and eliminates the problem.
- 10 So you provide a second service. You space them out 11 plenty enough to allow people to come in and go out.
- 12 You know, it's -- again, it's all in a trickle
- 13 manner, and it's all very, very slow, and that's the
- 14 solution. That would be two days a year.
- MR. CHARLES: And just one other
- 16 question. When you went through the diagram here,
- 17 one thing that we've seen are a lot of religious
- 18 institutions that have schools in the past few years
- 19 have been segregating the space where the students
- 20 are during the day and where, I don't want to use
- 21 the word transient the wrong way, people who are
- 22 coming and going over the five prayers. You'll have
- 23 people coming and going.
- Is there -- you know, is there a sense
- 25 there as to how to secure the area? Is that

1 it projects enough for everyone in the room to hear

- 2 it. If there is a use of a microphone, the
- 3 microphone is only announcing inside -- inside the
- 4 prayer area itself.
- As you mentioned and as, you know, this
- was discussed a lot during the previous hearings,
- the minaret is merely an Islamic iconic,
- architectural symbol in a mosque, and we're -- we
- 9 completely understand and are considerate of, you
- 10 know, the culture and the location and the
- 11 neighborhood. We have no plans to announce any
- 12 prayers outside whether using a microphone or
- 13 without a microphone.
- MS. DOYLE: Okay. Thank you. That's 14
- clear. Different religions have different 15
- 16 assistance or prophets or priests or clergy, and
- some of those live on the property individually and
- some religions have several priests or guiders for 18
- the religion. 19
- What -- how many priests or clergy 20
- serve in one particular mosque and do they live on 21
- the property, and if so, is it -- if it's more than
- one, is it in the congregational format or
- individual houses? 24
- MR. ABDELKADER: Okay. We -- in our 25

1 something that the board has on its plate to work

- 2 through or what's the plans right now?
- MR. ABDELKADER: I don't want to start
- 4 guessing, but, basically, I mean it's a daycare. So
- 5 it's going to have whatever security entrances and
- 6 needs that are needed to -- you know, similar to
- 7 what you would see in any other daycare facility to
- 8 secure the area where the children are, and there 9 are really no transients. It's all people either
- 10 from the community or work or that are familiar.
- MR. CHARLES: That's why I didn't want 11
- 12 to use that term, per se, but I know at one of the
- 13 churches I've been to, many events that take place,
- 14 they actually won't allow any adult activities to
- 15 take place at the same time as the children events
- 16 and small things like that just to secure the safety
- 17 and go above and beyond. It's just something that I
- think probably your board should think about.
- MR. ABDELKADER: Sure. We'll 19
- definitely keep that in mind, absolutely. 20
- CHAIRMAN RUSAK: Any other questions 21
- 22 from the board?
- MS. DOYLE: Yes, sir. Question on 23
- 24 either the religious preference or the cultural
- 25 preference for walking to worship. Is there a

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- 1 preference or an inclination for your members to
- 2 walk to worship?
- MR. ABDELKADER: No, not really. It's
- 4 not a requirement by any means. If it makes sense
- 5 to you, if you live or work within a reasonable
- 6 distance and it's nice out and you prefer to walk,
- 7 so be it, but there is no specific requirement
- whether to walk or drive or anything.
- MS. DOYLE: So there is no requirement.
- 10 Is there a preference, a religious preference?
- MR. ABDELKADER: No. 11
- MS. DOYLE: No. Okay. The last 12
- 13 question I have is there's a prayer -- a call to
- 14 worship, call to prayer.
- 15 MR. ABDELKADER: Yes.
- MS. DOYLE: And that in other countries 16
- 17 may be done through a minaret either with or without
- amplification, and you already stated there will be
- no amplification of the human voice. How is the
- call to prayer accomplished? 20
- MR. ABDELKADER: Basically, it's 21
- 22 literally like the person doing the call to the
- 23 prayer will stand up to the front of the prayer area
- 24 and literally makes the call to prayers without --
- 25 most of the times without even a microphone. I mean

- 1 religion and beliefs and practices, we don't have
- 2 any particular clergy. It's not a group of people.
- 3 It's not multiple people. Typically, you have an
- 4 Imam. An Imam means like a religious leader who
- 5 would lead the prayer and give the sermon. Maybe
- you will have another, you know, Imam as a backup.
- They live in their homes. I mean, in this event,
- 8 there is no place -- there is no place for them to
- 9 actually live or reside. So nobody is going to live
- 10 on the premises, and that's pretty much the extent 11 of it.
- Other than that, cleaning will be done 12
- 13 either by like a cleaning service or volunteers from
- the community. It's an honor that you would
- 15 actually keep a mosque clean. I mean I vacuum the
- 16 prayer space myself, and that's about it. Anything
- 17 else is typically done like, you know, the entire
- 18 community just simply -- they just simply go and
- everyone does what he does in terms of whether it's 19 20 cleanup or setup or so forth.
- 21 MS. DOYLE: Thank you, sir.
- MR. ABDELKADER: You're welcome. 22
- CHAIRMAN RUSAK: Any other questions? 23
- Now, I'd like to turn it over to the 24
- 25 members of the audience. If you'd like to come up,

- 1 Who will the office be occupied by?
  - MR. ABDELKADER: Just for the Imam or
  - 3 board members if they need to go in and take care of
  - bills or like clerical matters and so forth.
  - MR. EISDORFER: No secretary office,
  - 6 administrator?
  - MR. ABDELKADER: One of the board 7
  - 8 members is a secretary. He's the secretary.
  - MR. EISDORFER: I mean on site, an 9
  - 10 employee, a secretary, a clerical person, someone
  - who keeps the files?

  - 13 everything with our own like volunteers and board
  - 14 members or community members who volunteer their
  - 15 time. So there might not necessarily be an employed 16 secretary.
  - MR. EISDORFER: Right now you're 17
  - 18 operating catch us if you can. Once you have a
  - building, you're going to have actual files in a
  - location rather than people's homes, membership
  - 21 files, attendance records for your students.
  - MR. ABDELKADER: Correct. 22
  - MR. EISDORFER: So someone has to 23
  - 24 handle that. Someone has to pay the bills.
  - MS. TUBMAN: Please let him finish his 25

- MR. EISDORFER: Overnight the toilets
- 10 need to be cleaned, the places have to be swept.

- MR. EISDORFER: So you'll have a 12
- cleaning service and they will come in every day? 13
- MR, ABDELKADER: I can't guess. 14
- MR. EISDORFER: A professional 15
- custodian. 16
- MR. ABDELKADER: What do you mean by a 17
- professional custodian? 18
- MR. EISDORFER: A janitor, somebody 19
- who's employed comes every day. 20
- MR. ABDELKADER: That's one option. 21
- MR. EISDORFER: You don't know how many 22
- 23 janitorial staff you'll need?
- MR. ABDELKADER: No. I don't. 24
- MR. EISDORFER: You have an office. 25

- 1 question and let him answer. Steve, please finish
- the question.
- 3 MR. EISDORFER: My question is
- finished. 4
- MR. ABDELKADER: The students' records
- would be maintained by the staff who are actually 6
- running the daycare naturally. 7
- MR. EISDORFER: Do you charge dues? 8

- 25 service that comes on and does that kind of stuff?

- 1 there is a lot of people who are retired or not

  - 22 or where they go to?
  - MR. ABDELKADER: No. I mean no.
  - 4 MR. EISDORFER: Okay. After the end of
  - 25 the Eid salah, how fast do they disburse?

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- 1 MR. ABDELKADER: Yeah.
- 2 MR. EISDORFER: What percentage of your
- 3 attendance is still coming in during the prayer?
- 4 MR. ABDELKADER: I'm usually praying.
- 5 So I'm not sure, but at times I'm also all the way
- 6 in the back sitting in the lobby, and you can
- 7 literally have five, 10 people walk in while the
- 8 prayer is taking place.

- 22 prayer is over, how fast do people leave? I take it
- 23 they're all going -- by and large, on Friday, people
- 24 are coming from work. Is that correct?
- MR. ABDELKADER: The majority, yes, but

- 1 MR. ABDELKADER: Usually, you have 10
- 2 people, maybe five people who get up right away
- 3 because they need to leave, and then the rest are
- 4 very, very slow trickle.

- (Recess taken.) 19
- CHAIRMAN RUSAK: Okay. We'd like to 20
- 21 continue with the questions from the public.
- Mr. Mc Namara. 22
- MR. MC NAMARA: Thank you, Mr. 23
- 24 Chairman. For the record, Patrick Mc Namara from
- 25 the law of firm of Scarinci & Hollenbeck on behalf

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- MR. EISDORFER: Afternoons, evenings.
- MR. ABDELKADER: They don't take place
- 3 right now. So I cannot really tell you when they
- 4 would take place. I would imagine evenings after
- 5 the children go back home, have dinner, finish their
- 6 homework or any work that they need to do. So it
- would be in the evening, most likely, and weekends.
- MR. EISDORFER: Now, is there -- is
- 9 there any religious prohibition -- would there be
- 10 any religious prohibition on streaming the prayer
- 11 service into the other rooms in the building?
- MR. ABDELKADER: No, no religious 12
- prohibition for that. 13
- MR. EISDORFER: Would there be any
- 15 religious prohibition to streaming the prayer
- 16 service into the covered walkway around the
- building? 17
- MR. ABDELKADER: It wouldn't make sense 18
- because nobody would be sitting outside. 19
- MR. EISDORFER: Would there be a 20
- 21 religious prohibition?
- MR. ABDELKADER: No. 22
- MR. EISDORFER: I'm familiar that in 23
- 24 countries in the Middle East often salah is
- 25 broadcast outside the mosque and all prayer and you

- 1 of Mr. and Mrs. Rinaldi.
- Good evening, sir.
- 3 MR. ABDELKADER: Good evening.
- MR. MC NAMARA: First couple of
- 5 questions I want to ask you are regarding services
- you provide to your adults in your congregation.
  - In the site plans -- and I can't read
- that one even with my bifocals. So I have to read
- 9 one in front of me. So I apologize for the paper
- 10 rattling.
- You have several rooms to the left of 11
- 12 that central corridor that are labeled religious
- 13 education, community services, two of them just past
- the library and another one religious education
- 15 office.
- What do you envision in any type of 16
- 17 adult courses of study or programs where people can
- come and join other members of your congregation in
- 19 studying the Quran or other religious documents who
- 20 are engaging in discussions?
- 21 MR. ABDELKADER: We actually have had,
- unfortunately, limited number of interfaith meetings
- with our friends at the Presbyterian church where we
- 24 sat down and we discussed various views of the
- 25 difference to religion and their perspective to

- 1 programs and these classes, but we have not even
  - 2 ventured into their numbers or their demand or
  - 3 anything to that nature.
  - MR. MC NAMARA: Do you envision ever
  - conducting any outdoor services for your
  - 6 parishioners?
  - MR. ABDELKADER: No.
  - 8 MR, MC NAMARA: Is that something
  - that's normally not done at Islamic centers of this 10
  - MR. ABDELKADER: Yes. Typically, all 11
  - your services and everything that you do is inside
  - 13 the building. Outside is just simply parking.
  - There is no room really to do a whole lot. 14
  - 15 MR. MC NAMARA: The reason I ask, you
  - understand at my parish they offer sunrise services
  - outdoors in a small park next to our church on 17
  - 18 Easter morning and Christmas morning. I'm not
  - 19 familiar enough. So that's the reason I'm asking.
  - MR. ABDELKADER: I understand. 20
  - MR. MC NAMARA: Do you intend to have 21
  - 22 any type of summer camp program from the youth of
  - 23 your congregation and to other youth here in the
  - community?
  - MR. ABDELKADER: I can't guess or 25

1 certain things.

- I've attended several meetings where
- 3 one of them was -- you know, I don't want to start
- 4 taking too much time, but, basically, we had
- 5 interfaith meetings at their church. We have
- 6 invited other members of the community to come to
- 7 the small, modest place that we perform our daily
- 8 prayers to, you know, educate them about Islam or
- tell them what we are about.
- There might be other classes that may 10
- 11 go into the explanation of the meaning of the Quran
- and certain verses, maybe try to explain or
- 13 demystify certain aspects that might seem strange to
- 14 other culture or other religions, these type of
- classes and services. 15
- MR. MC NAMARA: Do you have any idea of 16
- 17 how many classes of this nature you would offer in a
- 18 given week on the calendar?
- MR. ABDELKADER: I wouldn't even start 19
- 20 to guess. We're barely starting. You know, we have
- 21 not eyen started. So I couldn't tell you, and it
- 22 would most probably be as demands require and as
- needed. 23
- MR. MC NAMARA: There are a couple of 24
- 25 rooms around the corner past the stairwell that are

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- 1 marked seniors lounge, community services.
- Do you anticipate providing services or
- 3 programming that is tailored to retirees or other
- 4 senior citizens who might be members of your
- 5 congregation and what would they be?
- MR. ABDELKADER: That is our hope.
- 7 That's one of the things that I described in my
- 8 testimony that we would provide, you know, different
- classes and services tailored to the age group and
- 10 the need.
- I couldn't tell you what they are now 11
- 12 because, again, we -- I mean right now we are seven
- 13 board members and we do everything. We have not --
- 14 we haven't even started to think about what -- you
- 15 know, what these classes will be and how many of
- 16 them or what we're going to offer. That's a ways
- 17 from now.
- MR. MC NAMARA: Have any of your board 18
- 19 members looked at other centers of this nature that
- 20 are located here in Central New Jersey to look at
- 21 the types of programs they're offering their
- 22 congregants and the frequency and the type of
- programs that are being made available or that are
- 24 being demanded by congregants?
- MR. ABDELKADER: We are aware of these 25

- 1 answer that. I mean, when that bridge comes, we'll
- 2 cross it I guess. MR. MC NAMARA: Do you envision renting 3
- 4 out the facilities not only to congregants but to
- 5 other people who might want to conduct certain
- 6 activities here, meetings here, whether it's boy
- scouts or cub scout group or other type of local,
- 8 civic, nonprofit or secular religious organization
- that needs a place to meet?
- MS. TUBMAN: That's about six 10
- 11 questions, Pat.
- MR. MC NAMARA: Okay. I'll start one
- 13 at a time. Do you envision renting out the facility
- for other groups to use what's laid out in the plan
- 15 here?
- MR. ABDELKADER: What I can tell you is 16
- 17 everything is within reason and within the capacity
- and within, you know, what we -- what we can allow.
- If it's renting the space out for prayers for 19
- another religious group similar to how the Christ
- 21 Presbyterian Church, our friends, were so generous
- to allow us to pray at our space, absolutely. 22
- It's not going to be rented for 23
- 24 weddings or major events or anything near that.
- 25 It's not going to be -- it's going to be just

- 1 simple, modest events like church, so forth.
- 2 MR. MC NAMARA: I have no further
- 3 questions of the witness, Mr. Chairman. Thank you.
- 4 CHAIRMAN RUSAK: Thank you.
- We now open the floor to the public.
- 6 If anyone from the public would like to come up, you
- 7 can take seats in the front row and then we can go
- 8 down through. Again, please state your name, spell
- 9 it and your address in Bridgewater. Thank you.
- 10 Mr. ARORA: Hello. Thank you. My name
- 11 is Moneesh Arora, M-O-N-E-E-S-H A-R-O-R-A. I live
- on 42 Fuller Court in Bridgewater which is located
- 13 roughly three to four blocks from the site.
- 14 I have a few questions. I'll start
- 15 with the daycare center.
- 16 MR. COLLINS: Please raise your right
- 17 hand. Do you swear or affirm to tell the truth, the
- 18 whole truth or nothing but the truth so help you
- 19 God?
- 20 MR. ARORA: Yes, I do.
- MR. COLLINS: Thank you.
- MR. ARORA: You mentioned that you'll
- 23 be operating a daycare center. Just given that the
- 24 property is adjacent -- directly adjacent to a
- 25 residential neighborhood, have you done any sort of

- 1 MR. ARORA: So the answer is you have
  - 2 not done an assessment of the noise impact to the

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- 3 neighborhood?
- 4 MR. ABDELKADER: No, we have not. No,
- 5 I have not.
- 6 MR. ARORA: Thank you.
- 7 The footings for the pillars appear to
- 8 be permanent structures which I would imagine would
- 9 allow to expand in the future if you chose to do so
- 10 and have proper permits. Is that something that
- 11 you've contemplated?
- MS. TUBMAN: That's not a question he
- 13 can answer, but it is a question whose answer is
- 14 dictated by the ordinance. We have virtually maxed
- 15 out the amount of square footage of building that
- 16 can be put on the property, and if those were
- 17 enclosed, we would be in violation. We would need
- 18 to come back to a different board for a variance.
- 19 MR. ARORA: Thank you.
- 20 I understand that several adjacent
- 21 homes have wells, well water for their drinking and
- 22 household use. Have you done an analysis as far as
- 23 environmental impact on those neighboring properties
- 24 for potential water runoff from your parking lot
- 25 that you plan to pave and expand on the premises?
  - MS. TUBMAN: That's more than one
- 2 question. Were you hear when our engineer was here,
- з sir?
- 4 MR. ARORA: No, I'm not. I'm sorry.
- 5 MS. TUBMAN: We are reducing the amount
- 6 of pavement on the property.
- 7 MR. ARORA: The answer is you have not
- 8 done an analysis to the potential environmental
- 9 impact to the homes that have well water?
- 10 MS. TUBMAN: I can't make an assumption
- 11 that adjacent homes have wells. I don't know the
- 12 answer.
- MR. ARORA: I'm asking a question if
- 14 you've done an analysis on the impact of the
- 15 adjacent properties that may have wells?
- MS. TUBMAN: The answer is no.
- MR. ARORA: That's a yes or no
- 18 question.
- MR. ABDELKADER: We have not, but it
- 20 isn't going to be any different than the property
- 21 existed now or operated for the last 70 years.
- 22 There won't be any change.
- MR. ARORA: You also stated you don't
- 24 know how many people will be coming because you
- 25 don't know where they're coming from. You don't

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1 noise assessment or any type of impact analysis what

- 2 30 to 50 children -- what type of noise it might
- 3 generate when they're outdoors, whether it be in the
- 4 evening or daytime, on the neighboring properties?
- 5 MR. ABDELKADER: Our landscaping
- 6 engineer is going to actually -- is going to be the
- 7 next witness, and he is going to talk about
- 8 landscaping and trees and buffers and so forth. So
- 9 I'm not going to be able to assess that or cover 10 that.
- 11 What I mentioned earlier is that in any
- 12 daycare -- actually, I don't want to guess, but I
- 13 believe all except one or two of the houses of
- 14 worship in Bridgewater are surrounded by houses in
- 15 all four directions. They are in the center and in
- 16 the middle of residential areas. We will be no
- 17 different, and like I said, it's unfeasible and
- 18 unrealistic to allow all 40 kids out at the same
- 19 time. It doesn't happen.
- When we took our kids to daycare, we
- 21 know that they were out, you know, in a certain
- 22 hour, and they alternate all the classes. So, most
- 23 likely, you won't have, again, I don't want to 24 guess, 15 percent of the kids out all the time.
- 25 You're not going to allow all 40.

- 1 know -- a lot of the estimates that you provided,
- 2 you're unclear on how you come up with it because,
- 3 I'm paraphrasing, you have not thought about it yet.
- So you can't, you know, with confidence
- 5 or I haven't heard any testimony that would lead me
- 6 to believe that you could state that with any
- 7 certainty. So that's a statement more than a
- 8 question.
- So do you have any certainty that you
- 10 could provide given you haven't been able to provide
- an analysis that would substantiate your estimates?
- MR. ABDELKADER: The certainty or what 12
- 13 I can testify to is that we have pretty much -- we
- 14 pretty much are static in our numbers for the last
- 15 three years. What I can tell you is that two days
- 16 of the year we will be doing what the previous
- 17 facility probably did on a weekly basis. I can tell
- 18 you that during the week the numbers are going to be
- minimal compared to the -- to what the current
- facility -- you know, the way it operated before. 20
- So all in all, it's going to be a 21
- 22 reduced -- significantly reduced use in comparison.
- That's what I can tell you. 23
- MR. ARORA: Okay. I'm just trying to 24
- 25 understand how it would be significantly less if you

1 haven't done an analysis to compare what the prior

- MS. TUBMAN: He has, and it's in the 1
  - 2 transcript of the first hearing which is on file in

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- 3 the municipal building.
- MR. ARORA: Thank you. 4
- And then my last question is, relative 5
- to statements that you made that I'm just trying to
- reconcile, because I've made notes and I'm not able
- to reconcile the numbers, you made statements that
- the application has 250 occupants, 45 children
- 10 potentially in the daycare, but at the same time,
- 11 you minimized those estimates when asked about the
- 12 potential use at any one time.
- 13 In addition, you've stated that you
- 14 don't know where people are going to be coming from.
- 15 You don't know how many kids are going to be coming.
- 16 You don't have a plan around the daycare to
- 17 understand what the attendance, enrollment or
- participation will look like. You don't know how 18
- many employees you will have, handyman, janitor. 19
- How have you made an assessment around 20
- 21 the use of the property and estimates if you stated
- 22 all the things that you don't know as opposed to
- what you know? 23
- I apologize. I do have one more 24
- 25 question after that.

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- MR. ABDELKADER: No, no, not a problem.
- 2 I'm just trying to remember all the things you
- 3 asked.
- MR. ARORA: I wrote them down, but I'm 4
- happy to remind you.
- MR. ABDELKADER: No. I'm trying to
- remember that last series of questions. Okay. The
- numbers on the application, for example, the 250 for
- the Friday prayer, as I indicated, this is a best
- guess estimate on our part. Right now, our number
- 11 is roughly around 90, nine zero. That's where we've
- been for the last three years.
- In terms of growth, I don't have a 13
- crystal ball and nobody does. I cannot tell you
- 15 what the growth is going to be.
- In terms of not knowing where people 16
- 17 are coming from or going to, that's just simply
- meaning I don't know if they're coming from their
- work or from their home. It's not that I mean --
- 20 the faces that I see on a weekly basis are the same.
- 21 They have not changed. It's all the same faces. I
- 22 know them practically one-by-one, not by name. I'm
- 23 bad at remembering names. I know the faces.
- 24 They're the same people. Every once in a while you
- 25 see a new face, but he's probably coming visiting or

2 use was compared to your projected use. So are there any other statistics or 3

- 4 studies that you have done to substantiate your
- claim? 5
- MR. ABDELKADER: No. 6
- MR. ARORA: Okay. Thank you. Will 7
- there be lights in the parking lot?
- MR. ABDELKADER: That's something that
- 10 I should probably leave for our lighting engineer
- when he testifies, but there will be lights. 11
- MS. TUBMAN: I'm sorry you weren't here 12
- 13 for the first hearing. There was testimony about
- 14 lighting in the parking lot.
- MR. ARORA: Thank you. I'm sorry I was 15
- 16 not here, and I didn't do my homework. So I do have
- follow-up questions. I can look at the records if
- this was answered already. 18
- Has there been an assessment done --19
- based upon what I'm hearing, there's going to be
- 21 access day and night for volunteers and potential
- 22 employees to access the property. So are those
- 23 lights -- is the intention for those to be on
- 24 overnight and do you -- has the engineer done an

25 assessment on the impact to the nearby properties?

- 1 on a business trip or so forth and he looks us up.
- 2 What else? I apologize. What else did
- 3 you ask?
- 4 MR. ARORA: I think that's sufficient.
- 5 I appreciate it. Just one last question.
- 6 MR. ABDELKADER: Sure.
- 7 MR. ARORA: So you mentioned that, if
- 8 this facility was at capacity, you would turn people
- 9 away which is common in other commercial
- 10 institutions, houses of worship.
- Given this is a two-lane road, one lane
- 12 going each way directly in front of the property,
- 13 what is your plan for traffic management and your
- 14 ability to forecast when you're going to have to
- 15 turn people away and how to have them actually exit
- 16 the area under normal conditions and when there's
- 17 snow around?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Well, in other mosques
- 19 and in other services that I've attended and even at
- 20 our own service, when we had the Friday prayer fall
- 21 on a major holiday or a day off or anything to
- 22 that -- anything similar to that, we've had up to
- 23 five and six people of the community outside at
- 24 various locations directing traffic and helping
- 25 people and letting them know we're full, you know,

- 1 who will testify at a future hearing.
- 2 MR. ARORA: Okay. Thank you. I
- 3 appreciate you answering the questions, and I

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- 4 apologize for not reading the transcripts of the
- 5 prior meetings. Thank you.
- 6 MR. ABDELKADER: Not at all. Thank
- 7 you.
- 8 CHAIRMAN RUSAK: Thank you. Next.
- 9 MS. AVENOSO: My name is Kelly,
- 10 K-E-L-L-Y, Avenoso, A-V-E-N-O-S-O, and I live at
- 11 1111 Crim Road.
- MR. COLLINS: Do you swear or affirm to
- 13 tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the
- 14 truth so help you God?
- 15 MS. AVENOSO: Yes, I do.
- 16 In your schedule, understanding you
- 17 follow a lunar calendar and the services are
- 18 dictated by that, what is the earliest time in any
- 19 12-month period that people would be arriving at the
- 20 mosque?
- MR. ABDELKADER: I would say 5:45 and
- 22 you're talking about two to five people.
- MS. AVENOSO: I understand. Similarly,
- 24 what is the latest in any 12-month period?
- And let's assume that your holidays or
- 1 holy days are falling during a season when the sun
- 2 sets latest in our -- on our clock. What is the
- 3 latest then that people would be leaving the mosque?
- 4 MR. ABDELKADER: Eleven months out of
- 5 the year --
- 6 MS. AVENOSO: No, on a worst case
- 7 scenario.
- 8 MR. ABDELKADER: Eleven months out of
- 9 the year it would be at 10:30 p.m. after the last
- 10 prayer of the day. During the month of Ramadhan and
- 11 only that month, it would be 11:30. It could go to
- 12 midnight.
- 13 MS. AVENOSO: Okay. Thank you. In
- 4 your religion, you have your services in which the
- 15 couple is married --
- MR. ABDELKADER: My apologies. When I
- 17 say 11:30 to midnight, again, you're talking about
- 18 the last -- I'm giving you the worst case scenario
- 19 the last person leaving. I don't mean that you're
- 20 talking about five or six people leaving at that
- 21 time.
- MS. AVENOSO: Okay. Thank you.
- 23 In your religion there's the religious
- 24 services affiliated with getting married. Is there
- 25 a reception anywhere whether at the facility or at a

- 1 like, for example, at the Green Knoll Firehouse.
- There is the main parking, and there is
- 3 the rescue squad parking next door. They would tell
- 4 them this is full. There's additional parking here.
- 5 So we had people stand out to direct people and to
- 6 help them out.
- 7 In terms of turning people away and how
- 8 that's going to happen, they're not going to need to
- 9 make a U-turn on the road. There's a drive-through
- 10 and there's a big area where they can enter the
- 11 parking lot and exit again safely and without any
- 12 incident.
- 13 It's not that we're going to literally
- 14 make a K-turn or a U-turn on the road itself. We're
- 15 not going to like close a gate and not allow them to
- 16 come into the building. In terms of snow, we'll
- 17 just manage just like any other institution, any
- 18 church, any synagogue.
- MR. ARORA: So given it's a one-lane
- 20 road and cars would be waiting to enter, determine
- 21 if it was full and then exit, there's a potential
- 22 that cars will be lined up on the road because there
- 23 is no ability to pass on a road which has a double
- 24 line down the center of it.
- MS. TUBMAN: We have a traffic engineer

- 1 second facility? MR. ABDELKADER: Absolutely, if they
- 3 chose to have a reception, but, typically, it's
- 4 really their religious ceremony that's performed at
- 5 the mosque, not the reception.
- The reception I mean from after that
- 7 religious ceremony to actually, you know, do you
- 8 take her, do you take him and so forth, and then the
- 9 husband and wife typically would have hired a hall
- 10 for the reception similar to any wedding, any
- 11 typical wedding that you know of.
- MS. AVENOSO: Okay. So I'm Catholic 12
- 13 and we have a similar pattern. Although, I've been
- 14 at weddings where they've had -- they've brought in
- 15 caterers and they've had receptions there at the
- 16 church. That would be within the realm of
- possibility at the mosque.
- 18 MR. ABDELKADER: I really can't answer.
- We haven't decided whether we would allow this or
- 20 not. I don't know.
- MS. AVENOSO: So it would be in the
- 22 realm of possibilities since you haven't decided, it
- 23 might not, depending on what the board decides or
- whoever your governing body is.
- MR. ABDELKADER: It would be tough. We 25

- 1 functions that you were talking about?
  - Could that be provided as well as
  - 3 monthly or a year calendar on what your -- what it
  - would look like? Is that a possibility?
    - MS. TUBMAN: You can answer that.
  - MR. ABDELKADER: I try as much as 6
  - possible to go through all the services that we hope
  - 8 to provide and to describe what they are. I don't
  - 9 see 12 things happening at a time. I'm not sure --
  - I'm not sure how we can see that. 10
  - MS. AVENOSO: Do you want me to go 11
  - 12 through my list?
  - MR. ABDELKADER: No, no need. 13
  - MS. TUBMAN: The specific question was 14
  - 15 have you or will you develop a calendar typical
  - 16 services, typical activities and will you project
  - 17 that over a year?
  - MR. ABDELKADER: That's going to be 18
  - 19 tough to manage with seven board members dealing
  - with everything we're dealing with. We have not
  - 21 have that kind of calendar yet.
  - MS. AVENOSO: Well, for instance,
  - 23 there's the morning prayer. Then you have daycare
  - 24 drop off. If it's Sunday school, you're going to
  - 25 have a drop off. You have midday prayer. You

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- 1 don't have a kitchen. We don't have a cooking
- 2 kitchen. We have a meeting kitchen, and I don't see
- 3 how that's going to be managed to have a reception
- 4 similar to the one that you're describing.
- MS. AVENOSO: Your community now is
- 6 certainly staggered in a variety of locations for
- 7 both religious purposes and the various community
- 8 functions that you provide to them, and it was a
- 9 very impressive list of the breadth and depth of
- 10 what you provide.
- Trusting that, once this facility is 11
- 12 built, all of those services and various functions
- 13 are going to be in the mosque, I started mapping out
- 14 what a typical day would look like, and it looks
- 15 like at any given time there could be up to 12
- different things between the services and the kids
- coming and the kids going and whatever. That's a 17
- much more intense description than five people I
- think at morning services and so on. 19
- Would you be able to give us some 20
- 21 calendars of activity on a typical day versus during
- 22 one of your holy seasons so we can get a true sense
- 23 of even just a regular what is predictable, not even
- 24 the 10 or 12 additional community services that you
- 25 talked about, just your regular run of the mill

- 1 talked about youth services.
- By the way, will they be bussed? How
- 3 will kids get from school to the youth services
- 4 after school or is that to be determined? Maybe
- that's to be determined.
- MR. ABDELKADER: That's going to be
- parents dropping off their kids.
- MS. AVENOSO: Okay. So you have that
- 9 function. Then you have the third prayer of the
- 10 day. Then you have daycare pick up. Then you have
- 11 the sunset service. Then you talked about more
- 12 kids' activities after they go home and have dinner
- 13 and get their homework done. Then there's the
- 14 two-hour or after sunset service. Then there's the
- 15 cleaning service and then there's 10 or 12 other
- 16 things, and I didn't even include what you call the
- 17 extra credit prayers during Ramadhan, and that's
- 18 just based on what I heard. So that's pretty active
- 19 for any given day.
- So is that a pretty good start of what
- 21 breadth and depth and on any given day at your
- facility? 22
- MR. ABDELKADER: Can I go through one 23
- 24 of my analogies?
- MS. TUBMAN: Sure. 25

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1 to also use that facility for religious or community

- 2 engineering school for his first day after high
- 3 school and he entered one class and he walked out

MR. ABDELKADER: My father went to

- 4 and said absolutely not, and he simply went to a
- 5 different school altogether. What he realized
- 6 later, the teacher was actually going through the
- 7 syllabus for the entire year explaining what they're
- going to learn.
- You're basically going through the
- 10 entire list reading it one-by-one, and it sounds
- 11 extremely huge and impressive. This is not going to
- 12 happen all at once. It's not going to happen near
- 13 as you make it sound. It's going to be a handful of
- 14 people. It's going to be completely staggered and
- 15 not all of them at once.
- MS. AVENOSO: I didn't say at once. I 16
- 17 said you were the one who had said in your testimony
- 18 that you have prayer before sunrise, daycare. My
- 19 kids went to daycare. I know that's a drop off in
- 20 the morning. Then there's the midday prayer. Then
- 21 you talked about having a place for the kids to go
- 22 after school. Then you talked about a third prayer,
- 23 and then there's daycare pick up. I know that
- 24 because I used to do that too. Then you talked
- 25 about more kids' activities after they get done with

- 2 services?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Just similar to how
- 4 you can go to the Catholic church in Basking Ridge
- or Bridgewater or Martinsville, they are free to go
- wherever they want to go.
- MS. AVENOSO: Then we'll have --
- essentially, we have two being proposed within 10
- 9 minutes. Okay. I'm sorry. That was inappropriate.
- 10 I was supposed to ask questions.
- Okay. You had talked about situations 11
- 12 where there would typically be one person per car,
- 13 sometimes three people per car and sometimes,
- 14 particularly, if it's during your holiday that falls
- 15 on a school holiday, you're going to have families
- 16 coming. You're going to have four to six people per
- 17 car, and that's great, and you had talked about you
- 18 would not let more people in the building than the
- occupancy rating that it has. 19
- It may be a bizarre question, but I am 20
- 21 an engineer. So I do ask bizarre questions. If
- 22 it's a reverse situation where you don't have four
- 23 to six people per car but you actually tap out the
- 24 number of available parking spaces before you meet
- 25 the building occupancy within the building, what's

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- 1 their homework. Then there were the services two
- 2 hours after sunset. Then there was some kind of
- 3 cleaning that was going to come in on a regular
- 4 basis. Then there were 10 or 12 other community
- 5 related services that you said would be done on an
- 6 as-needed basis. That's 10 not even getting to the
- as-needed basis, and that's just regular.
- That's a regular day, right? 8
- MS. TUBMAN: She can't read a nod. 9
- MR. ABDELKADER: Yes. 10
- MS. AVENOSO: Thank you. 11
- MR. ABDELKADER: I will do my best when 12
- 13 we have time with the board members, the seven of
- 14 them, dealing with all the duties we do to probably
- 15 get a feel from other mosques and other churches and
- 16 other synagogues how they run their day, and I
- 17 can -- it's not going to be any different than any
- 18 of them.
- MS. AVENOSO: Okay. Thank you. And, 19
- 20 again, I know it -- I know it as Catholic. I can go
- 21 to the Catholic church in Martinsville, the Catholic
- 22 church in Basking Ridge. As I understand it, there
- 23 is also a mosque being proposed in Basking Ridge
- 24 which is probably 10 minutes away.
- Are the members of your community able

- 1 your backup plan when you -- let's say you have 300
- 2 people in the building, but you don't have any more
- 3 parking spaces left. What happens to the other
- cars?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Originally, I'm an
- engineer too. So I'm familiar with these kinds of
- questions. We have two limitations, either parking
- or occupancy of the building. Whichever is reached
- 9 first, that's where it ends, and that's where we
- turn people away. It's that simple.
- MS. AVENOSO: Okay. So no parking on 11
- 12 streets?
- MR. ABDELKADER: No. There is no place 13
- 14 to park on the streets.
- 15 MS. AVENOSO: I agree. Okay. The
- 16 other question has to do with you had talked about
- what the usage of the facility and we keep going
- back to this eight-foot canopy. I know what the
- 19 architect had said about the use of the eight-foot
- canopy, that it's for people to congregate and chat
- after services. 21
- Based on your projection of services of 22
- 23 people attending, why do you need an eight-foot
- canopy around the entire perimeter of the building?
- MS. TUBMAN: The architect testified 25

- 1 that he found that an attractive design feature. It
- 2 is not a need.
- 3 MS. AVENOSO: Okay. All right. Good.
- 4 That's good to know. Okay. Thank you very much.
- 5 MR. ABDELKADER: Thank you.
- 6 MR. LU: My name is William Lu from
- 7 Bridgewater.
- 8 MR. COLLINS: Sir, you were previously
- 9 sworn. Is that correct?
- 10 MR. LU: Yes.
- 11 MR. COLLINS: Do you understand you're
- 12 still under oath?
- 13 MR. LU: Yes.
- 14 MR. COLLINS: Thank you.
- MR. LU: I came in half an hour late.
- 16 So I missed your name. Can you spell it for me
- 17 please?
- 18 MR. ABDELKADER: Yasser first name.
- 19 Last name A-B --
- MR. LU: How do you spell?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Y-A-S-S-E-R. Last
- 22 name A-B-D-E-L-K-A-D-E-R.
- MR. LU: And what's your capacity?
- 24 MR. ABDELKADER: I'm sorry. What do
- 25 you mean by capacity?

- 1 MR. LU: -- opposition on you building
  - 2 a mosque on that site. However, according to the
  - 3 public record, you went ahead and purchased and
  - 4 closed on that property on April 24, 2012. Can you
  - 5 explain to me why?
  - 6 MS. TUBMAN: That is not a question for
  - 7 this forum. We are a conditionally permitted use
  - 8 for purposes of this application.
  - 9 MR. LU: Okay. How many members are in
  - 10 your organization?
  - MR. ABDELKADER: We don't have an
  - 12 actual membership or sign up. I'm not -- I'm not
  - 13 going to be able to tell you exact numbers. What I
  - 14 gave probably in the half hour that you missed are
  - 15 the numbers that we see currently today in our
  - 16 services. Whether it's the five daily prayers or
  - 17 the Friday sermon and prayer or the Eid prayer, I
  - 18 gave those numbers earlier.
  - 19 MR. LU: How many?
  - MR. ABDELKADER: About 19 people for
  - 21 Friday prayer midday. Around 300 for Eid prayer
  - 22 which is two times a year, and for the daily
  - 23 prayers, anywhere between two people and 12.
  - MR. LU: How many of these people are
  - 25 resident of Bridgewater?

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- 1 MS. TUBMAN: What is your position?
- 2 MR. LU: What's your position?
- 3 MR. ABDELKADER: I am the president of
- 4 the board of Alfalah Center.
- 5 MR. LU: Thank you.
- 6 MR. ABDELKADER: You're welcome.
- 7 MR. LU: Can you refresh my mind? When
- 8 was last planning board hearing? Was it 2010 or
- 9 2011?
- MS. TUBMAN: 2011 other than the two
- 11 that were last month.
- MR. LU: Right. Okay. Can you tell me
- 13 why did you pick the Redwood Inn site for your --
- MS. TUBMAN: That's not an appropriate
- 15 question. A mosque or any house of worship is a
- 16 conditionally permitted use on that property.
- MR. LU: Can you tell me, based on the
- 18 last hearing, there were a lot of oppositions on you
- 19 building the mosque in that site and --
- MS. TUBMAN: I'm sorry. I didn't
- 21 understand the first part of that question.
- MR. LU: The question was in last
- 23 planning board hearing there were a lot
- 24 opposition --
- 25 MS. TUBMAN: Opposition.

- MS. TUBMAN: That's not a relevant
- 2 question, nor does he know the answer. There will
- 3 be a transcript of the testimony that you missed
- 4 available in the municipal building.
- 5 MR. LU: Are you a resident of
- 6 Bridgewater?
- 7 MR. ABDELKADER: Yes, I am.
- 8 MR. LU: For how long?
- 9 MS. TUBMAN: Don't answer that
- 10 question. That's not an appropriate question. The
- 11 use is permitted by ordinance.
- MR. LU: On the public record, your
- 13 mailing address is Pluckemin, not Bridgewater.
- 14 MS. TUBMAN: I'm sorry, sir. You asked
- 15 that question at the last meeting, and the answer
- 16 was that Alfalah has a post office box in Pluckemin.
- MR. LU: That's correct. Why?
- 18 MS. TUBMAN: Mr. Chairman, this is not
- 19 a line of questions that addresses the ordinance.
- MR. COLLINS: Sir, you should move on
- 21 and focus on questions that are relevant to this
- 22 proceeding.
- 23 MR. LU: Okay. My next question I
- 24 would need to use the -- I have a PDF file, and can
- 25 I use the laptop up there?

- MS. TUBMAN: Or split the services. 1
- MR. ABDELKADER: Or split the services. 2 questions. If you have a presentation --2
  - MR. LU: No, it's not. It's related to
- 4 the question I'm going to ask.
- MR. COLLINS: Sir, you can only use
- 6 exhibits in the case. You can ask a question based
- 7 upon the exhibits that are already in the case and
- 8 you can ask a question that is based upon the

MS. TUBMAN: This is the period for

- statement that you make but --
- MR. LU: This question is related to 10
- 11 the statement he made.
- MR. COLLINS: That's fine, but you 12
- 13 can't use exhibits that are your own exhibits.
- That's for later on when you testify in the case. 14
- MR. LU: Okay. 15
- MR. COLLINS: And in the objector's 16
- portion of the case. Okay. Thank you.
- MR. LU: According to the list here, on 18
- 19 Wikipedia, the mosque in New Jersey, you testified
- 20 if your capacity -- fill to capacity you have to
- 21 turn people away and the next closest mosque is
- about an hour away.
- According to this list, I have
- 24 Plainfield, I have South Plainfield, Somerset,
- 25 Piscataway, New Brunswick, and why did you testify

- Thank you. 3
- MR. LU: And I went to the Google map,
- 5 and visualized each mosque, their map location.
- It's all in here. There's none similar to this
- narrow route location like the one you are
- purchasing -- you already purchased.
- And my question for you is why did you
- select this location? 10
- MS. TUBMAN: A house of worship is 11
- 12 conditionally permitted on this site.
- MR. LU: Okay. I'm going to -- I'm 13
- going to read you this from your own website. The
- legal effort is currently underway to win back our
- 16 right to build a house of worship like every other
- 17 faith community here in Bridgewater. Many, many
- thanks -- many, many thanks to our devoted legal
- team who have been working tirelessly pro bono and 19
- at no charge for our cause. 20
- Has Bridgewater denied you from 21
- building any kind of mosque? 22
- MS. TUBMAN: That is not relevant in 23
- these proceedings.
- However, yes, the ordinance was changed

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- 1 they have to drive another hour to go to that
- 2 mosque?
- MR. ABDELKADER: I didn't testify that 3
- 4 they have to drive one hour. I just simply
- 5 indicated those mosques -- the closest mosques are
- 6 roughly 35 minutes without traffic. During lunch
- 7 hour or during any time, you do the math, or you try
- to take that drive during the middle of the day. MR. LU: Can you repeat that again
- 10 please?
- MR. ABDELKADER: What I testified is 11
- 12 just simply that the distance to the two nearest
- 13 mosques that I can think of is about 35 minutes in
- 14 two different directions, and that that 35 minutes,
- 15 that's with the GPS or MapQuest would give you, not
- 16 what the realistic drive during traffic on 287 or
- 17 the side streets with how long it would take.
- MR. LU: Why would you say two 18
- 19 directions? What do you mean two directions?
- MR. ABDELKADER: There's two different 20
- 21 mosques. I gave two examples at two different
- 22 mosques. That's all.
- MR. LU: Okay. 23
- MR. ABDELKADER: And, yes, we would 24
- 25 turn them away for safety and for the rules.

- 1 in 2011 which made this a nonpermitted use. We are
- 2 back because a federal court has said this
- 3 proceeding shall go forward without reference to or
- 4 reliance on the public ordinance that the court
- 5 found problematic.
- MR. LU: So my question to you is you
- promote faith, and on your website, you are bringing
- up this propaganda and you -- do you respect the
- 9 neighbors in this particular site? Are you creating
- MS. TUBMAN: That is not a relevant 11
- 12 statement or question and we are --
- MR. COLLINS: Sir, I agree with Ms. 13
- 14 Tubman. Sir, you have to move on and focus on
- questions about the site plan, the conditional use 15
- application. 16

10 a fight?

- MR. LU: No. I'm very curious about 17
- 18 why he's fighting for this.
- MR. COLLINS: The objection is it's not 19
- 20 relevant, sir, and the ruling is that it is not
- 21 relevant. So please move on.
- MR. LU: I don't have any more 22
- 23 questions at this time.
- CHAIRMAN RUSAK: Thank you. Next. 24
- MS. RACK: My name is Susan Joseph 25

- 1 Rack. I'm a resident of Martinsville at 1381
- 2 Mallard Drive, R-A-C-K.
- 3 MR. COLLINS: Please raise your right
- 4 hand. Do you swear or affirm to tell the truth, the
- 5 whole truth and nothing but the truth?
- 6 MS. RACK: I'm a pastor. My yes is
- 7 yes, and my no is no.
- 8 MR. COLLINS: But the answer is yes?
- 9 MS. RACK: Yes. Thank you.
- 10 I would like to first correct the
- 11 record, if I may, regarding the necessity of a
- 12 professional janitor or cleaning service for a house
- of worship. I am the pastor of a house of worship
- 14 in Bridgewater, and in the 12 years that I have
- 15 served there, we have never had a permanent
- 16 janitorial staff, and the community is capable of
- 17 keeping the building in good repair and clean by
- 18 volunteers. So that's my first comment.
- 19 My question to you, Mr. Abdelkader, is
- 20 that I understand that the Muslim tradition does not
- 21 allow alcoholic beverages on the property?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Correct.
- MS. RACK: So where as the Redwood Inn
- 24 would have allowed parties with the use of alcoholic
- 25 beverages, there's no occasion for alcoholic

- 1 or go from that site during the hours of that
  - 2 evening and at nighttime prayer?
  - 3 MR. ABDELKADER: None that I'm aware
  - 4 of, and I actually tried my best -- actually, I made

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- 5 sure to ask you if you ever heard from any of your
- 6 neighbors about any situations. There were
- 7 absolutely none.
- 8 We have basically, again, come in in a
- 9 very, you know, trickle manner. We perform the
- 10 prayers. We leave quietly. There's no music.
- 11 There's no loud sounds. There's no socialization
- 12 outside, and pretty much last Ramadhan and this
- 13 Ramadhan would be the latest time in the year that
- 14 they fall. After that, they become earlier and
- 15 earlier. Thank you.
- MS. RACK: And when you use your
- 17 facilities that you're currently using for your
- 18 worship services, whatever they may be, including
- 19 Ramadhan, how do you take care of cleaning the
- 20 facilities that you use and taking care of garbage
- 21 and recycling?
- MR. ABDELKADER: We try to leave the
- 23 facility in the same or better condition that we
- 24 used it. Basically, at the beginning, at the
- 25 beginning of the service, the prayer, we need to
- 1 roll out our prayer mats because we need to pray on
- 2 area that has not been stepped on with shoes that
- 3 you came from outside obviously, and we basically do
- 4 our service. We perform our prayers.
- 5 Sometimes there are very light
- 6 refreshments, cookies, coffee, water, and then at
- 7 the end everyone just simply rolls up their sleeves
- 8 and chips in. We roll up our rugs. We clean. We
- 9 vacuum. We make sure the bathrooms are completely
- 10 wiped and cleaned and that everything is left as it
- 11 was until the next day.
- MS. RACK: I do confirm that that is
- 13 our experience of you, that you have been
- 14 extraordinary tenants.
- 15 MR. ABDELKADER: Thank you.
- MS. RACK: And we have not received any
- 17 complaints from neighbors regarding your comings and
- 18 goings. Thank you very much.
- MR. ABDELKADER: Thank you so much.
- 20 Thanks a lot.
- 21 CHAIRMAN RUSAK: Thank you. Next. If
- 22 anyone else would like to come forward, we'll try to
- 23 get everyone in this evening.
- MR. FIALKOFF: Richard Fialkoff, 1203
- 25 Geiger Lane in Bridgewater, New Jersey. F, as in

- 2 MR. ABDELKADER: True. Alcohol is
- 3 completely forbidden for Muslims. Yes.
- 4 MS. RACK: And I know that there are
- 5 some churches in the area that enjoy worship in the
- 6 style of rock music and large screens and rather
- 7 raucous and joyous celebration.
- Would you characterize your Muslim
- 9 style of prayer in similar ways? Would those things
- 10 be happening at the mosque?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Sure. We actually do
- 12 not actually even allow music or, you know, anything
- 13 that relates to that in the mosque. It's not
- 14 permitted, and our prayers -- the extent of our
- 15 prayers is one person in the front using a
- 16 microphone like this with this kind of voice
- 17 internally inside the room to lead the prayer by
- 18 reciting verses from Quran, from our holy book while
- 19 the rest of the congregation standing, lining up
- 20 behind him and following him in prayer. That is the
- 21 extent of it.
- MS. RACK: You have been doing your
- 23 Ramadhan prayers at my church for the past three
- 24 years. To your knowledge, has there ever been a
- 25 complaint regarding parking or noise when you come

- 1 solutions for Eid. I assume you're talking about
- 2 Eid prayer, the two days of the year where we
- 3 previously sworn? 3
- MR. FIALKOFF: No.

1 Frank, I-A-L-K-O-F-F.

MR. COLLINS: Please raise your right

MR. COLLINS: Richard, were you

- 6 hand. Do you swear or affirm to tell the truth, the
- whole truth and nothing but the truth so help you
- God? 8
- MR. FIALKOFF: Yes, I do. I want to
- 10 get back to two items that came up, the noise and
- 11 the parking, particularly, when you exceed capacity.
- First of all, the noise. You indicated 12
- 13 that there's no prayer outside. Is there any
- prayers conducted with windows open so that the
- 15 noise will be leaving the building or how is that
- process typically handled?
- MR. ABDELKADER: We do not leave 17
- 18 windows open for any purpose or any reason. My
- guess is during the winter you need to maintain the
- heat and during the summer you have the AC running.
- So I doubt that there would be any need to open
- windows or doors and even at that you wouldn't --
- you wouldn't be able to hear anything outside.
- MR. FIALKOFF: Okay. Good. Thanks.
- MR. ABDELKADER: Sure.

- MR. FIALKOFF: Exactly, I am. 4
- MR. ABDELKADER: Two things we can do. 5
- Either have two services, two services enough apart
- in time to allow people to come in and go out safely
- without any issues, and many, many mosques actually
- do that. They hold multiple services.
- The other solution is that we rent 10
- 11 space somewhere else that accommodates our needs and
- 12 also other mosques have opted to do that for many,
- 13 many years. Even though they have their own mosque,
- 14 for those two days of the year where you have high
- capacity, they'll rent the Double Tree, and they'll
- go park -- they'll go conduct the two -- the two Eid 16 prayers there. 17
- MR. FIALKOFF: Right. At what point 18
- 19 will you know you're out of capacity and you're
- going to reach capacity so you don't have all that 20
- traffic coming to the area to be turned away? 21
- 22 MR, ABDELKADER: That's something that
- I cannot predict or tell. 23
- MR. FIALKOFF: Just trial and error 24
- 25 basically.

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- MR. FIALKOFF: Regarding the capacity,
- 2 you mentioned you'll just turn people away, but what
- does that mean when you say turn people away?
- MR. ABDELKADER: It means that we will
- 5 be extremely, super apologetic and tell the people
- 6 before they even exit their car as they enter maybe
- 7 the circular drive through that, unfortunately, we 8 have reached capacity. We are unable to accommodate
- 9 any more either cars or individuals. Otherwise, we
- 10 would be in violation and there would be a safety
- 11 hazard and that we were very, very sorry and that
- 12 they would need to be turned away.
- And by the way, just a side note, just
- 14 the fact that they have come to perform the prayer
- 15 and to worship, they've got full credit. They've
- 16 got full credit for it in the eyes of God. It's
- 17 irrelevant whether they were able to actually make
- 18 it inside or not.
- MR. FIALKOFF: Do you expect to do 19
- 20 anything proactive and if you've got to particularly
- 21 hire man service for Ramadhan where you might expect
- 22 a crowd to exceed capacity? Do you have any people
- 23 bussed in from some other parking lot you've made
- arrangements with?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Well, there are two

- MR. ABDELKADER: It will be, basically,
- 2 as we learn about our pattern and our attendance and
- 3 our needs, we will accommodate and we will adjust
- 4 accordingly and do whatever is necessary.
- MR. FIALKOFF: Okay. Thanks.
- So assuming you still have room
- capacity but you're out of parking capacity, you
- 8 mentioned there's no parking on the streets at all,
- 9 but I'm concerned what about a block away as the
- crow flies about parking on a lot of the surrounding
- residential streets and then people walking over.
- 12 How do you expect to control that?
- MR. ABDELKADER: We actually announce 13
- 14 during the sermon and at the end of the sermon
- anything that is important and relevant. We will be
- extremely clear about the fact that there's
- absolutely not to be any parking on the streets.
- There isn't any room to park on the streets. You
- know, the nearest location that you can park to walk
- over there, it's just unfeasible, unrealistic. 20
- MR. FIALKOFF: What about in the 21
- 22 arrangements with people who might give permission
- 23 to cut through their property if there are houses
- 24 that can provide, you know, perimeter access
- 25 somewhere to the property and park on their street?

- 1 MR. ABDELKADER: Abdelkader.
- 2 MS. HOZENY: First of all, I want to
- 3 thank you for educating some of us, although it was
- 4 brief, on your religion because a lot of us don't
- 5 understand it and perhaps we have, you know, some
- 6 apprehension about it, but I want to say that you
- 7 made me feel very good tonight.
- 8 MR. ABDELKADER: Thank you very much.
- 9 It was my pleasure, and like I said, I'd be here
- 10 until they kick me out of the building. I'd be glad
- 11 to talk to you as long as you want.
- MS. HOZENY: According to the 2010
- 13 census, the population of the Muslim mosque in
- 14 Somerset County is almost 3300 scholars, 3300 and
- 15 continues to grow. That said, do you envision that
- 16 your congregation will grow?
- I know you tried to answer it with the
- 18 numbers of participants that you have with the
- 19 various prayer services and the two big holidays
- 20 that you have, but in most churches and synagogues,
- 21 we kind of like our congregation to grow and expand
- 22 because we rely on our participants to help fund the
- 23 congregation.
- So with that said, do you expect and
- 25 would you envision that your congregation will grow?

- 1 Would you allow people to get
- 2 permission from say a homeowner and essentially park
- 3 on a street and cut through their property.
- 4 MR. ABDELKADER: With the very, very
- 5 heavily wooded lot around from most directions of
- 6 the building, I don't think that's going to be in
- 7 the realm of possibility.
- 8 MR. FIALKOFF: Okay. You mentioned
- 9 you're not going to put a fence around the property.
- MS. TUBMAN: That was not his
- 11 testimony.
- MR. FIALKOFF: That was your comment.
- 13 Excuse me.
- MS. TUBMAN: I said the daycare play
- 15 area would be fenced.
- MR. FIALKOFF: Okay. So you do expect
- 17 to fence in the property or not, or that's an
- 18 engineer's question?
- MR. ABDELKADER: I really don't know
- 20 what the need is going to be. I mean it's been
- 21 operated for the last 70 years the way it is now.
- 22 So I have no idea what the need will be.
- MR. FIALKOFF: Thank you. That's my
- 24 last question.
- I guess just comment. I've lived in

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- 1 the neighborhood, and as I said, I can hear things
- 2 at the Redwood Inn, and I know you've said several
- 3 times that the activity is going to be no different
- 4 than we've seen in the last 70 years.
- 5 I've lived in my house for the last 25
- 6 years, and, basically, I'm on that header on the
- 7 chart there just across the street from the backyard
- 8 at the Redwood Inn, and over the last 20 years I've
- 9 heard noise there one Saturday night. So there's
- 10 not been a lot of activity there. It's been a
- 11 pretty much unused, low-key facility.
- So thank you for responding to my
- 13 question.
- MR. ABDELKADER: Thank you.
- 15 CHAIRMAN RUSAK: Thank you. Next.
- MS. HOZENY: My name is Fran Hozeny. I
- 17 live on Top Place in Bridgewater, and I have been
- 18 sworn in before.
- 19 MR. COLLINS: Ms. Hozeny, you
- 20 understand you're still under oath.
- MS. HOZENY: Yes. Would you just
- 22 pronounce your name for me?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Sure. First name
- 24 Yasser. Last name Abdelkader.
- 25 MS. HOZENY: Abdelkader.

- MR. ABDELKADER: We would like and we
- 2 wish that it would grow at a reasonable, you know,
- 3 rate, you know, that the Bridgewater Township
- 4 population grows which I believe -- I don't want to
- 5 give numbers. In fact, I was looking it up one day,
- 6 and I think Bridgewater grew 3, 4 percent in the
- 7 last 12 years. So I do expect it to grow.
- 8 I don't see in Bridgewater a thousand
- 9 home developments being developed. Bridgewater is
- 10 pretty much built up.
- 11 MS. HOZENY: Yes.
- MR. ABDELKADER: People will move in,
- 13 people will move out probably at the same rate,
- 14 maybe slightly different. So I do expect growth. I
- 15 don't expect it to be huge or anything that's
- 16 outrageous.
- MS. HOZENY: Well, I think that a lot
- 18 of the concern too is the Hindu temple on Route
- 19 202/206. Now that started out a little small and
- 20 then they expanded and they expanded and they
- expanded, and now we see there are four residences
- 22 there, and I think it is a concern to most of the
- 23 residents that live in the Redwood Inn vicinity that
- 24 it will expand more, and I do think that is
- 25 truly a big concern of many of us because it will

- 1 have an impact if that does happen on the area.
- MS. TUBMAN: I didn't respond because
- 3 that really wasn't a question, but I will attempt to
- 4 answer your -- I will attempt to answer your
- 5 concern.
- We are at almost the limit of what
- 7 could be -- is conditionally permitted on this site.
- 8 We could not put an Imam residence because of the
- 9 square footage limit even though it would be
- 10 permitted. So we are --
- MS. HOZENY: Capacity. 11
- 12 MS. TUBMAN: -- at capacity now unless
- 13 we come back with another application to a different
- board with a variance request.
- MS. HOZENY: Okay. Thank you very 15
- 16 much.
- MR. ABDELKADER: Thank you very much. 17
- 18 MR. MALLELA: My name is Shiv Mallela,
- S-H-I-V M-A-L-L-E-L-A. 19
- MR. COLLINS: Sir, you understand 20
- 21 you're still under oath.
- MR. MALLELA: Yes. 22
- 23 MR. COLLINS: Thank you.
- 24 MR. MALLELA: Hi.
- 25 MR. ABDELKADER: Hello.

- 1 or whatever, more than 200. You can project, but I
  - 2 can project also that you could grow to a thousand

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- 3 meaning that, if I look at other temples like the
- 4 Hindu temple is a good example and there's also a
- Sikh temple, those places have grown. So there's no
- reason to believe that you're not going to grow.
- MR. ABDELKADER: We are -- as Ms.
- Tubman said, we are simply bound by our current
- square footage and allowed parking. We are pretty
- 10 much at capacity right now. We maxed out. There is 11 no place to grow.
- 12 I know that there were many references
- 13 to the Hindu temple, and I am not going to even
- venture to talk about it or discussing it in any
- positive or negative manner because it's none of my
- business.
- MR. MALLELA: No. 17
- 18 MR. ABDELKADER: I drove -- I drove by
- 19 the Hindu temple twice a day for five years to go to
- 20 my shop to work, and I know exactly the concerns,
- 21 and I completely understand it, and I know what
- you're talking about.
- We don't have anything outside. We
- 24 don't have anything that resembles or comes near
- 25 what you're witnessing at the Hindu Temple. You're

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- 1 comparing apples and watermelons. It's that simple.
- MR. MALLELA: A couple of things, sir.
- 3 First thing is, at this moment, the previous
- testimony that we heard said the capacity of 500
- people for the site.
- MR. ABDELKADER: Actually, it's 437 --
- 7
- MS. TUBMAN: Architect's testimony. 8
- MR. MALLELA: Was it 437? 9
- MR. ABDELKADER: I'm sorry. That was 10
- 11 the architect's testimony.
- MR. MALLELA: So, basically, the site
- 13 can accommodate more people than you are citing in
- 14 terms of the numbers that you're seeing right now.
- 15 So you can have growth in number of people there
- without growing the site or the facility, right,
- 17 because the numbers you have quoted earlier, you say
- 18 70 people, 80 people, whatever. So numbers can be
- 19 much bigger given the same size.
- MR. ABDELKADER: Again, we are 20
- 21 basically bound by the limitation of the capacity
- 22 and the limitation of the parking. These are our
- 23 limits. We can't go outside it.
- The amount of growth that you're 24
- 25 referencing, I'll leave that as a problem for my son

MR. MALLELA: A few questions. So you

- 2 don't really have a membership because you don't
- 3 know how many members you have because you don't
- 4 keep track of members.
- MR. ABDELKADER: No, we don't.
- MS. TUBMAN: That was two questions.
- Would you say that you do not keep track of members?
- MR. MALLELA: You don't know who comes.
- You don't have a list, nothing.
- MR. ABDELKADER: We don't have a
- 11 membership. We don't track members of the
- 12 community, and in terms of who comes and who goes,
- 13 it's basically -- like I said, it's the same faces
- 14 that we see every single week.
- MR. MALLELA: So -- but you have a
- 16 list. You have a list of people.
- MR. ABDELKADER: No, we don't. We 17
- don't have a list of people.
- 19 MR. MALLELA: So the question is, at
- 20 this point, you have certain number of people who
- come to your services.
- Now, once you built a mosque, 22
- 23 definitely, other people in other townships will
- 24 want to move into, you know, Bridgewater or nearby 25 township. So you could grow to like a few hundred

- 1 to resolve, you know, many, many years from now.
- 2 We'll cross that bridge when we get there.
- 3 MR. MALLELA: I wanted to give you some
- 4 numbers which is, the Hindu temple, when the initial
- 5 approval was given in '90 something, had -- it was a
- 6 church there in the area of three and a half acres.
- 7 Right now it's 20 acres. Okay. And you can imagine
- 8 how they got the 20 acres, because people sell
- 9 houses and they buy it out.
- So, in principle, you know, while you
- 11 can say, oh, we can't grow because the area, we'd be
- 12 limited by area, in principle, you can grow because
- 13 it's not out of the realm of possibility.
- MR. ABDELKADER: We can't afford the
- 15 houses around the area.
- MR. MALLELA: You can afford this one.
- 17 I think you're doing pretty well. You give me
- 18 numbers of 90 people who can afford this one.
- 19 Pretty good.
- 20 So I'm saying one of the things that
- 21 are of concern because the area, the size that you
- 22 can have, and while I do accept the numbers that you
- 23 have right now, I say 20 years from now you cannot
- 24 tell me what it's going to be like and nobody can
- 25 say. It could be big. It could be the same, but it

- w. 1 prayer at the time that -- you know, we can
  - 2 basically wait until towards the latter or closest
  - 3 period to before sunrise to perform it, and that's
  - 4 what we actually do. There's no point for -- and
  - 5 that's what any mosque does anywhere in the world.
  - 6 You don't need to get up at four in the morning and
  - 7 perform that prayer. You have from four until six.
  - 8 So you can perform it quarter to six comfortably
  - 9 without any issues.
  - 10 MR. MALLELA: No, but I'm saying I have
  - 11 seen the timings for prayers from mosque, New Jersey
  - 12 and elsewhere, and, usually, I see like hour to hour
  - 13 and a half before sunrise. Now, I don't understand.
  - 14 You're saying that you are an exception, but I'm
  - 15 going by what I read as a general statement.
  - MR. ABDELKADER: What you're seeing
  - 17 probably on their website is the calendar where
  - 18 they're telling people that's the time -- that's the
  - 19 cut off or the time where you can actually perform
  - 20 that prayer if you wish to.
  - 21 If you perform it before that time,
  - 22 it's still not valid, not ripe, whatever the
  - 23 expression is, but you have from -- so what you see
  - 24 on the website, I'm not sure whether you're
  - 25 referring to -- I'm just guessing or I'm trying to

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- 1 could be big also. That's what I'm saying. Okay.
- 2 MS. TUBMAN: That's not a question.
- 3 MR. MALLELA: It's not a question. All
- 4 I'm saying nobody can tell. You can't say. I can't
- 5 say. A lot of people. Right, I agree.
- 6 Now, the next question I have is this
- 7 has to do with an earlier question which was when
- 8 will the first prayer start when people would be
- 9 coming in. You said 5:45.
- 10 MR. ABDELKADER: Yes.
- 11 MR. MALLELA: Okay. My understanding
- 12 is the first prayer is about hour, hour and a half
- 13 before sunrise. It has to finish by sunrise,
- 14 correct?
- MR. ABDELKADER: Any of our prayers has
- 16 a range, has a window of time where you need to
- 17 perform that prayer. You don't need to -- so, for
- 18 example, just to give an example, the midday prayer,
- 19 which is one hour after high noon -- let's call it 1
- 20 p.m. So the prayer is -- you can start performing
- 21 the prayer at 1 p.m. The next prayer is going to be
- 22 roughly two and a half hours after that time. You
- 23 have two and a half hours to perform that prayer and
- 24 it's completely valid and acceptable.
- We don't need to actually perform the

- 2 you're seeing, is 4:30.3 MR. MALLELA: Right.
