MINUTES OF THE BRIDGEWATER TOWNSHIP COUNCIL SEPTEMBER 21, 2020 COUNCIL CHAMBERS

The Township Council of the Township of Bridgewater, County of Somerset, State of New Jersey, convened in a regular session on Monday, September 21, 2020 at 7:30 p.m. via electronic communication.

Council President Norgalis read the following announcement:

Council President Norgalis led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Council Reports

Councilman Ring (verbatim):

• I was recently contacted by the Somerset County Office of Emergency Management with an opportunity for the town to have a rain garden installed, funded through a Hazard Mitigation grant. Another municipality had been awarded the grant to have a rain garden installed, but backed out at the last minute. The funds were available, with a very small window to complete the project. Thanks to the administration and staff's efforts, there is new rain garden that was installed recently at our Senior Center.

- As previously reported, The Town held a ceremony back in August to honor Bridgewater's own Lt. Col Bob Vaucher. Since that evening, the township Public Works Department has cleared some brush and installed the sign, which was donated by D&R Greenway, along Foothill Road, near Twin Oaks, which identifies the Wemple property as the Vaucher Revolutionary Preserve. Thank you to the Administration and Public Works for their support in getting the sign installed.
- While we were not able to hold our 9-11 remembrance in person, I would like to thank our Constituent Relations Department for the video remembrance that they produced. I have received multiple positive comments on the video.
- Last week I participated in the quarterly meeting of the Township Emergency Management Council/Local Emergency Planning Committee
- Lastly, over the last couple of weeks, I have received several communications from residents on a variety of topics-
 - several emails from residents urging me to ensure the council does not legally require masks
 - Concerns with the upcoming election process
 - Request for the town to consider strengthening our Wireless Communications Facilities Ordinance
 - Request for us to review the township requirements on fences- in particular the changes last year to allow the installation of solid fences

Councilman Kurdyla: (tribute)

It is with great sorrow that I am reporting the passing of George Schofield. To me George, a remarkably successful businessman always took the time to care for his family and community. While George was involved in many activities, he never asked for recognition for what he had accomplished.

I first met George through the Finderne Fire Department, over 50 years ago, he was always there to support the needs of the Department as a member of the business community. When the Bridgewater Promenade project came along in the 1980's, Mayor Dowden approached George to serve on a Citizen's Advisory Committee to address concerns related to the project. I was also asked to serve along with Marguerite Chandler. In

our meetings George was a tremendous calming force by making comments to keep our discussions productive, at times in a very tense environment. I must note that Bob Vaucher was also involved at that time.

When the Promenade project was completed, discussions started for the need of an Open space program in Bridgewater Township. Again, George was deeply involved in the discussions on how to make this happen. George was instrumental in this body of work and along with Beth Powers set the course for a successful campaign to start the current program. I can still remember his words of advice, "Remember open space is great, just keep in mind that you have to pay for it".

Finally, George has spent the last 15 of the last 17 years volunteering with the Martinsville Rescue Squad. He started with the squad when he was in his 70's a time when most individuals stop being involved. In addition to the Martinsville Rescue Squad, George was a founding member of the Michael Bruce Fund, a fund established to help individuals with spinal cord injuries in the memory of a Bridgewater Lacrosse player Michael Bruce.

George's obituary has a comment about him leaving his mark on this world. I certainly agree and would like to add that Bridgewater Township has suffered a tremendous loss. George's contributions to our town should be recognized as a model for how to be involved not only for family and community but for mankind as well.

Councilman Kirsh

- Echoed Councilman Ring's sentiments regarding the 9-11 ceremony. It was done in a very meaningful way and thanked Wells Winegar, Deputy Township Administrator and the Office of Constituent Relations for this effort.
- We are now 10-days away from the end of the Census count and urged the residents that have not completed their Census to do so before September 30, 2020. Self-reporting is now at 83% and the remainder will be completed via field methods.
- Changes to the November General election include:
 We will have five (5) polling locations for provisional voting only. It is strongly recommended that voters make use of the Vote by mail ballots that will be sent out in the early days of October. Voters can return these ballots to the County via regular mail or drop them off at the drop box

located in the municipal building parking lot. Voters can also drop off their ballots at the polling on Election Day, as follows:

Councilman Kirsh confirmed the above locations and designations are slightly different from what took place during the Primary Election.

Council Vice-President Pedroso:

- Echoed the sentiments of other Council members regarding the 9-11 virtual memorial. He acknowledged the efforts of Mayor Moench for having the leadership to put forward a very touching virtual event. He also acknowledged the contributions of other staff members that contributed in this endeavor.
- Echoed the sentiments of Councilman Kurdyla regarding George Scofield.
- Attended the meeting of the Regional Center Partnership virtual meeting
- Wished all Jewish Community members a happy new year noting that Rash-Hashanah was this past weekend.

Council President Norgalis (verbatim):

- To our friends of the Jewish Faith I wish you a Happy New Year. One filled with good health and happiness.
- Unfortunately over the past few weeks there have been numerous passing
 of involved Bridgewater residents. To that list we add George Schofield.
 George who passed from us at 88 years old having been active in the

Martinsville Squad, Martinsville Community Activities and the Finderne Business Group where his family business, Geo. Schofield Co. Inc, was very well known.

- I participated in the Local Emergency Planning Committee meeting chaired by Police Sgt. Jamie Edwards. Dr. Gina Villani Board of Education Assistant Superintendent for Personnel was on the call and spoke about the tentative plan for hybrid classes to begin around Oct. 12th.
- "We support the Bridgewater Police Dept" signs continue to spring up in the town as residents show their support for the men and women in blue. One of the changes that will evolve over the coming months is a roll out of the police body camera program. While the cameras have been available for months, a number of software issues have delayed their use. Administrator Pappas will arrange for Chief Payne to address the Council, hopefully by end of year, on the program.

Mayor's Reports

Mayor Moench:

- George Scofield and his family's contributions to the Township go back for decades. Mayor Moench sent his sincere condolences to the family.
- Received an initial briefing on the status of the road assessment that is being conducted in order to help us with our long-term road plan. They have gone over every road in Bridgewater and have put together the raw data. As we continue to make progress, Council will be kept apprised and may be able to take a vote by the end of the year. Mayor Moench stated he is hopeful that as we go into 2021, we will have a road plan that we can use as a guide for our road priority plan.
- The COVID-19 pandemic numbers continue to decrease tremendously. He thanked the residents in working together as a community to accomplish this goal.
- For all the parents working on schooling for their children, he advised the school district is working towards a hybrid program in October. The township remains available to support the school district in ensuring the schools are reopened in a safe and efficient manner.
- Last Tuesday, he and other staff members had a meeting with the religious groups in the community who were asked to send a representative so that they can engage in a dialogue. Police Chief Payne is spearheading an effort to train religious leaders who want to be police Chaplains. More information will be provided as it becomes available.

- Three contracts are on tonight's agenda. Bids continue to come in under budget which helps us mitigate change orders and have additional resources to reinvest into additional road projects.
- Mayor Moench stated he appreciates Council's support on the shared services agreement with Hillsborough that is on tonight's agenda as it helps us save money for back up services.
- The cars on 1041 Route 202/206 have been removed as of this afternoon. Mayor Moench thanked the Council for their assistance at the last Council meeting in enforcing our zoning Ordinances.
- The Bulky trash program began last Saturday and will continue for the next two (2) Saturdays.
