Minutes

MAY 2 & 16, 2022 - REGULAR SESSION APRIL 21, 2022 - CLOSED SESSION

On motion of Councilman Norgalis, seconded by Councilman Ring, the May 2nd ad May 16th, 2022 regular session minutes were moved for approval and passed unanimously on a voice call vote.

Council Reports

Councilman Norgalis:

- Happy Fourth of July. I hope everyone had a safe and healthy enjoyment of our Nation's birthday.
- I was contacted by representatives of Dream Works LLC, a Bridgewater based company, seeking help with development of some property they own on Pearl St. I referred them to Planner Scarlett Doyle who will work with them on determining what changes are allowed under existing ordinances.
- My thanks to Dan Ahern of our OCR Group for his work with a family on Foothill Rd. who are impacted by some stalled development on the adjacent property.
- I was saddened to learn of the passing of former Mayor Al Griffith. Al was my neighbor, only three houses away, when I first moved to Bridgewater in 1975. He was a nice man and a good neighbor.

Councilman Pedroso:

Sent his condolences to the family of Former Mayor Al Griffith.

Councilman Ring:

- On June 28, the Planning Board met and reviewed the proposed ordinance changes related to the RSEED zone at the Center of Excellence. They also heard an application from the Center of Excellence to extend the approval that was issued back in December, 2019. While the extension was approved, it is important to note that this does not mean the hotel, supermarket and apartments are being built; approving the extension was a formality included in the settlement agreement. Over the next couple of months, Advance Realty will be submitting a new application to the Planning Board for the Life Science Center as previously announced. Assuming that new application is approved, the approval previously issued under the old application becomes null and void.
- This past Monday, I was honored to attend the Washington Campground Association 4th of July Service. For those not familiar with this event, it is held on the Washington Campground property off of Middlebrook Road here in Bridgewater every year. It commemorates the encampment of the fledging American Army in the area from May 28 to July 2, 1777 and again from December 1778 to June 1779. Most think it was the first place where the first official American flag (a 13-star flag designed by Francis Hopkinson, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence) was flown in 1777. Through a special act of Congress, the Hopkinson flag is

allowed to be flown here 24 hours a day without lighting. Each year, on Independence Day, the flag is changed and the Declaration of Independence is read.

- Earlier today, I was asked by the administration to participate in a meeting with some folks from the 4H Fair. It is important for our residents to note that after a 2-year hiatus due to Covid, the 4H Fair will be back in Bridgewater in Milltown Road at the Fair grounds from August 10th to the 12th
- Lastly, 47 years ago this past Friday, the Township of Bridgewater held what was called an "Organization Day Meeting", during which Alfred Griffith was sworn in as the first mayor elected by the residents of Bridgewater, under the then new Faulkner Act form of government. In addition to having previously served on the Town Council and as the Mayor under the old form of Township Committee, Mayor Griffith was also a History Teacher at Bridgewater Raritan High School West. Mayor Griffith will forever have the distinction in the history books as being the first Mayor of Bridgewater elected by the residents of the Township. The honor and responsibility of this was not lost on Mayor Griffith. From what was referred to as the 'Mayor's Statement' in the July 1, 1975 meeting minutes:

I am thrilled, excited, and humbled by the honor and responsibility that has been given to me by my friends and neighbors as Bridgewater's first elected Mayor. Much of the tremendous pressure and anxiety within me over the past two months are about to be released as we assume office knowing that our written reorganization is about complete. We have worked with good legal advice cooperatively and persistently at creating an organization that not only complies with the framework of the Faulkner Act but also seem to be well suited for the unique qualities of our fine community. We admit that we might make some mistakes, but our decisions have been made in good faith and are subject to change if they don't meet our expectations.

 In the interest of time, I am not going to read his full speech, but did find some interesting comments about how Bridgewater was run back in 1975: The Bridgewater Colonial Color Guard presented the colors. The Mayor had a management team of seven directors and an Executive Secretary (Shirley Kline). That team did not include a Director of Public Safety, Director of Planning and Development or a Business Administrator, as those three positions still had to be hired. Along with the Mayor, five council members were also sworn in at that meeting following which, a drawing was held to pick two council members to serve a four-year term and three council members to serve a two-year term. We thank Mayor Griffith for his service to Bridgewater Township and may he rest in peace.

Council President Kurdyla

- Appreciated the work of former Mayor Al Griffith. He was a wonderful servant to Bridgewater Township and a gracious leader.
- Last weekend, he along with the Open Space committee walked a
 property. A report and recommendation with regard to same is being put
 together. Councilman Kurdyla added he will be presenting a name to
 appoint a person to the Open Space committee who has served on this
 committee in the past and will be a welcome addition.

Presentation

SENIOR CENTER COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG)

Wells Winegar, Deputy Township Administrator was present and made presentation as follows:

Last year around this time, we were awarded the CDBG grant by Somerset County for improvements to the senior center. Funding for this came from the CARES act where we were originally awarded \$220,000 to make COVID resilient improvements to the Senior center. These included touchless bathroom fixtures, toilets, urinals, touchless light fixtures, an outdoor deck area that would replace the court that is currently in disrepair and some new touchless doors. There will also be HVAC UV filters to clean the air inside the senior center. We have gone out for an RFP, received some responses and are ready to move forward with this project. The total award was for \$254,778.42 of which we will fund upfront then receive quarterly reimbursements until the entire amount is fully reimbursed in 12 months. The CFO has recommended a short term note in order to fund this project and move forward. All the reimbursements will go directly to paying back the note.

Council was in consensus that the proposal is in good order.

Township Administrator Pappas explained administration is recommending that this firm be engaged by the township to provide an enhanced training program for our police department. The attorney general's office has extensive training requirements for all police officers and as such, it has been the practice with the Bridgewater Police Department to exceed the training that our officers undertake. This is a well-known firm that has been utilized by the State police, various prosecutors' officers and other agencies.

Training will be conducted virtually. A unique feature of this program is that if a police officer takes advantage of this training and goes through the entire program, the Fairleigh Dickinson University has endorsed giving 3-college credits to those officers.
