MINUTES OF THE BRIDGEWATER TOWNSHIP COUNCIL OCTOBER 17, 2022 COUNCIL CHAMBERS

The Township Council of the Township of Bridgewater, County of Somerset, State of New Jersey, convened in a regular session on Monday, October 17, 2022 at 7:30 p.m. in Council Chambers in the Municipal Complex, Bridgewater, New Jersey 08807 & via Live Online Broadcast.

Acting Council President Kirsh led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Minutes AUGUST 15, 2022 & SEPTEMBER 8, 2022 - REGULAR SESSION On motion of Councilman Norgalis, seconded by Councilman Ring, the August 15, 2022 and September 8, 2022 regular session minutes were moved for approval and passed unanimously on a voice call vote.

Council Councilman Norgalis:

Earlier today, Duke Farm in Hillsborough celebrated its 10th Anniversary as an Educational Facility and Nature Preserve during a two-hour open house. Our own Duke Island Park, part of the Somerset County park system, was a gift from the Duke Estate

- Councilman Norgalis stated that while the Mayor will report on the Quarry Town meeting held last week at the quest of the township, he has been advised the six residents who attended were provided with very detailed information about the short term and long term (40 more years) quarry operation
- Next week, the 2022 Toast to Scouting Awards Dinner will be held at the Bridgewater Manor. Our very own Councilman Ring will be the Master of Ceremony. Tim is also an Eagle Scout. One of the folks being recognized at the dinner is Robert Swisher a partner in Suplee Clooney Co which is the Township Auditor
- Residents of Rolling Knolls Way are seeing the Top Line Construction Co. apply the final asphalt coat to their street reconstruction. In talking with three residents from that street, Councilman Norgalis reported they are overjoyed with the company doing the work and the projected outcome
- The Indian Celebration of DIWALI is next week at the Hindu Temple. It is a splendid demonstration of culture which includes music and dance
- The monthly Municipal Alliance meeting chaired by Lynne Hurley of the Township Recreation Dept. was held last week. Mental Health first aid and the problem of fentanyl, a synthetic opioid being imported to look like candy are major concerns. Two Bridgewater Police School Resource Officers were present. Councilman Norgalis stated he asked them after the meeting about the school safety officers employed by the BOE and they indicated there are no conflicts although both organizations patrol the same halls.

Councilman Pedroso:

- Attended the HOME of Somerset County event this week. HOME does a lot of work at the County to help the homeless. They honored their founder, Kathy Savo as this year marked its 30th anniversary. Her husband, William B. Savo was our township attorney for many years
- Bridgewater Township is holding its annual Halloween event on the 30th from 3pm-5pm
- Acknowledged and congratulated the Somerset Patriots for bringing home the eastern league championship trophy.

Councilman Ring:

• Councilman Ring stated that at a previous council meeting, he reported

on some resident concerns regarding the overall condition of the Bridgewater post office. He is happy to report that thanks to some of the recent efforts of the Office of Constituent Relations as well as the Patch Newspaper, the grass was cut and trimmed and they hired a landscaper who did considerable cleaning up of the post office landscaping

- A Zoning Board meeting is scheduled for tomorrow night. No new applications are scheduled to be heard but a resident is waiting on the approval of a resolution in order to commence work on their property before the winter seasons sets in. The Board meeting will be held virtually for the sole purpose of approving that resolution
- The Planning Board, on October 25th, will be hearing an application for a 120,000s.f. warehouse at a portion of the former Somerville Lumber site
- Ashley Sikora, Planning Board member and the Regional Manager for Lifetime is also being honored at the Toast to Scouting Awards Dinner next week.

Acting Council President Kirsh

- On October 5th, attended the Green Brook Flood Control commissioners meeting. The subject matter was exclusively flood mitigation that impacts Plainfield and communities even further to the East of Plainfield
- On Saturday, Councilman Kirsh stated he had the privilege of giving a brief welcome speech and ribbon cutting for the Alzheimer's walk which occurred at Duke Island Park
- Bags having the Bridgewater logo and the Bridgewater United Soccer Club logo were filled with food and other household products to the tune of over 800lbs for a donation that was made to the Food Bank of Somerset County. Councilman Kirsh thanked all that participated.

Mayor's Mayor Matthew C. Moench

- Reports
- Has nominated Captain John Mitzak to be the next Chief of Police. Mayor Moench stated Captain Mitzak has been acting chief since Police Chief Payne left and has done an amazing job
- We are continuing with the 2022 Road Program. We have a website <u>www.ourbwroads.com</u> which provides a status of all our current projects and has an interactive map where you can look up the quality of roads to see where it rates among other roads

- We have the Quarry public information session this week. Members of the public who were concerned about the Quarry and some of the aspects of it and the various regulations that the township can and cannot do with regard to the activities of the quarry were addressed on October 13th at the municipal building. Representatives from the Quarry and the State and the Township were present to address questions
- Had the honor of speaking at the National Mental illness Associations Walk which was held at Duke Island Park. There were discussions about what Bridgewater is doing especially with regard to police alliance coordinator position
- Honored to attend, along with his daughter Julia, a ballet at the Hindu Temple on Saturday night two weeks ago. It was a great event and night well spent
- Skate for the Paws event, a skateboarding fundraiser will be held on November 12th at the municipal building. Councilman Kirsh will be the representative on behalf of the township
- We will be going around the township talking to residents who want to have a one-on-one conversation with the Mayor. This will be done at different places in the township and residents are welcome to register. For those residents not available at the prescribed times, they can call the Office of Constituent Relations for specific arrangements.

Presentation BREAST CANCER AWARENESS

Representatives of "Dance for the Cure" and the Bridgewater Raritan High School Cheer Team were present to receive the proclamation. Councilman Howard Norgalis read the following proclamation:

WHEREAS, there will be over 275,000 new cases of invasive breast cancer in the U.S. in 2022; and

WHEREAS, over 40,000 Americans are likely to pass away due to breast cancer this year; and

WHEREAS, though these figures are tragic, all Americans rejoice that from 1989 to 2018, the breast cancer mortality rate decreased by over 40%; and

WHEREAS, this marked decrease is far more than just a statistic, for it represents over 400,000 women who have survived the disease who otherwise may not have; and

WHEREAS, the saving of those lives is directly attributable to advances in research, treatment, awareness and support that is spearheaded by organizations like Dance for the Cure; and

WHEREAS, Dance for the Cure is a 100% volunteer organization supporting breast cancer patients in Somerset, Hunterdon and Middlesex counties; and

WHEREAS, Dance for the Cure has so far gifted over \$850,000 in donations to individuals in these counties to aid them in their fight against breast cancer;

WHEREAS, Bridgewater resident Brooke Herbst and the Bridgewater Raritan High School Cheer Team, in coordination with Dance for the Cure's Ribbons of Hope initiative, hung pink bows at the Bridgewater Municipal Complex; and

WHEREAS, these pink ribbons are a symbol of hope for those fighting breast cancer now, a sign of support from all those who stand by them, a commemoration of those we have lost, and a mark of triumph for those women who have overcome this terrible disease; and

NOW THEREFORE I, Matthew C, Moench, Mayor of Bridgewater Township do hereby proclaim the month of October as National Breast Cancer Awareness Month and urge all the citizens of the Township to recognize Dance for the Cure and other critical programs like it throughout the nation, and the applaudable efforts of Ms. Herbst and the Bridgewater Raritan High School Cheer Team have taken to raise awareness and support for those confronting breast cancer in our community and all over the world

Proclamation SOMERSET PATRIOTS

Representatives of Somerset Patriots were present to receive the proclamation. Mayor Moench stated Somerset Patriots has been a great way for families to spend time together at an affordable rate and with excellent, quality play. He added the partnership with the Yankees is a great accomplishment. Council Vice President Kirsh read the following proclamation:

WHEREAS, the Somerset Patriots are a Minor League Baseball team based in Bridgewater Township; and

WHEREAS, the Somerset Patriots are the Double-A Affiliate of the New York Yankees, and compete in the Eastern League; and

WHEREAS, the team was founded in the late-1990's by entrepreneur Steve Kalafer and has been family owned and operated since. His vision was to bring

affordable family entertainment and the love for America's favorite pastime to Somerset County and the Central New Jersey area; and

WHEREAS, the Somerset Patriots have a long history of achievement during their 24-year history, having previously won six Atlantic League Championship Series Titles during the 2001, 2003, 2005, 2008, 2009, and 2015 seasons before moving to the Eastern League in 2021; and,

WHEREAS, this year, the Somerset Patriots, with a record of 83-53, won their first Eastern League Championship Series 2 games to 1 over the Erie SeaWolves; and

WHEREAS, the Somerset Patriots have now brought their 7th Championship Title to Bridgewater; and

WHEREAS, this championship title is the Somerset Patriots' first since the passing of founder and former chairman Steve Kalafer, and the first overseen and co-chaired by his sons, Jonathan and Josh; and

WHEREAS, this championship title is a testament to the legacy of Steve Kalafer, and proves that the Somerset Patriots are one of the America's premier minor league franchises; and

WHEREAS, Bridgewater Township is proud to be the home of the Somerset Patriots;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Mayor Matthew C. Moench and the Bridgewater Township Council do hereby congratulate the Somerset Patriots on their 7th Championship Title, First Eastern League Championship Title, and the continued success of Central Jersey's Favorite Double-A Team.

Presentation GIRL SCOUT TROOP 61097

Members of Girl Scout Troop 61097 made presentation.

Leila-

Made introduction noting the Girl Scouts live in Bridgewater-Raritan and are in sixth grade. They attend Eisenhower and Hillside Intermediate Schools and some have been in the troop since they were in kindergarten. One of the important parts about being in Girl Scouts is giving back to the community. In the past, they have done food drives, clean ups, baked cookies, donated back packs and entertained senior citizens. One important part about being a Junior Girl Scouts is the bronze award which they are finishing up after a few tough years due to COVID-19.

Natalie -

They earn the bronze award by completing a journey. They chose the outdoor journey which includes creating a take-action project based on observations of a local issue. This should be sustainable and should serve the community. As they completed their outdoor journey, one of their events was a trip to Scheeff Nature Preserve. The guide on the hike showed them a barn with a bat house and spoke about how important they are. As they later talked about their project, one idea was to build bat houses and place them in local parks as this is a sustainable way to help the community.

Emma-

One of the biggest reasons to install bat houses is for insect control. Bats can eat up to 1206 insects per hour. Once insects hear bats flying, they immediately start leaving that area so that helps reduce the number of bugs around a property. Bats are the best form of natural mosquito control. Mosquito bites can be annoying and itchy but they also carry disease so there are several important reasons to reduce their amount in our environment. Bats can also pollinate plants. Bees pollinate during the day while bats do it at night. Furthermore, bat poop is a good source of fertilizer.

Leila-

According to their research, the best place to build a bat house is near a water source. It should be placed at least 20-ft from the shore line and at least 20-ft away from the nearest tree line or large free-standing tree facing south east or south west where it will get 6-8 hours of direct sunlight. It should be 15-20 feet off the ground on a pole or post or building. Leila added it is not advisable to mount the bat box on a tree because it is easier for the predators to get them. They should be placed near a heavily trafficked area or near artificial lighting.

Veronica-

If the governing body approves their request to build bat houses for local parks, they will reach out to the park commissioner to discover the best place to put them and how many they can provide. They will then order the materials, build the houses and poles and hopefully have them in place by winter or spring. Bat houses can be installed anytime of the year though installation in the fall or winter allows time for any odors from building and painting them to go away. The bat houses are then ready when bats return from the winter destinations in search of summer housing. Veronica thanked the Council for listening to their presentation and hoped they would approve their proposal to build bat houses in local parks with guidance from the park commissioner.

Mayor Moench offered we can work with Public Works and the Park Board to get this done.

Councilman Norgalis made a motion to express their support of the girls scout proposal to build bat houses. Councilman Ring, seconded the motion. The vote carried on a unanimous voice vote.

PublicMembers of the public wishing to address the Council on any matter will be
allowed two minutes to speak unless there are unusual circumstances.

On motion of Councilman Norgalis, seconded by Councilman Ring, the meeting was opened to the public for comment.

Joseph Boyle, 1796 Middle Road, Martinsville, NJ 08836

Was present with several representatives from the Spring Run community. Requested that when the township gets around to paving their community, which consists of 85-homes, that it is done altogether as one instead of in sections as has been done in the past. He stated Spring Run community is a great place to live but their roads are deplorable and that residents are afraid of walking on the streets for safety reasons.

Mayor Moench stated that with the new Road Program initiative, we are doing entire neighborhoods at a time. The Spring Run Community has been a matter of discussion and doing it as a whole is much more cost effective.
