The Township Council of the Township of Bridgewater, County of Somerset, State of New Jersey, convened in a regular session on Thursday, June 8, 2023, at 7:30 p.m. in Council Chambers in the Municipal Complex, Bridgewater, New Jersey 08807 & via Live Online Broadcast.

Minutes

MAY 18, 2023 - REGULAR SESSION

On the motion of Councilman Norgalis, seconded by Councilman Kurdyla, the May 18, 2023, regular session minutes were moved for approval and passed unanimously on a voice call vote.

Council Reports

Councilman Kurdyla

 Met with the remaining members of the Martinsville VFW Post 6588 at Chimney Rock Park on Memorial Day. Councilman Kurdyla stated it was his 37th time meeting with this group.

 Attended an open space meeting on Monday, June 12th to begin planning for 2023-2024.

Councilman Norgalis:

- Thanked everyone for attending tonight's Council meeting and braving the poor air quality caused by the Canadian fires. Just a week ago, we generally had no knowledge of air quality measurements. Now we know under 40 is good and 400 is really bad.
- Participated, along with members of the Bridgewater Woman's Club, in working a concession stand at the Patriots Stadium. A portion of the proceeds will be returned to the Woman's Club to support their numerous missions. Councilman Norgalis stated he is an honorary member of the Woman's Club; he doesn't pay dues and doesn't get to vote.
- Was a guest of the RWJ Somerset Hospital Foundation at a small gathering at NATIRAR in Peapack. The main event was a talk by the Chief Operating Officer about the past, present, and future of the hospital.
- Attended the opening day of baseball at Patriot Stadium. Mayor Moench
 was one of the guest speakers along with Josh Kalifer, the co-owner of
 the stadium. This was to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of the Stadium.
- Attended the monthly Municipal Alliance meeting. There was an extensive discussion of some of the issues faced by our police SRO's. An extensive package of handouts has been developed and copies given to the SRO for their interfaces with students. One of the biggest issues in high school is vaping in the bathrooms. Some students feel vaping is safe but it is not. Other handouts covered alcohol and opiates.
- There was a JCP&L outage in the northwest section of Bridgewater that lasted about 4 ½ hours. One JCP&L spokesman said 360 customers were affected while their website said up to 1300. A squirrel chewed through an overhead wire and caused the issue.

Councilman Pedroso:

Attended the Somerset Patriots' 25th season anniversary celebration.
 Councilman Pedroso thanked the Kalifer family for the invite noting Steve was missed, but we know he was proud.

Councilman Ring:

- Attended the spring carnival and greeted residents during the bulky trash dump day. Our finance committee had a few meetings, and we made excellent progress on the first responders' memorial project.
- At a recent Planning Board meeting, the Petersburg Innovation Center unveiled its land use plans. The initial phase of development was showcased, with a goal to complete the site in three to four phases. A special Planning Board meeting on June 13th will address the M&M manufacturing facility and catalyst.
- Early voting impacted a Zoning Board meeting last week, but the next meeting is still set for June 27th in the courtroom.

Council President Kirsh

- President Kirsh stated that tonight, we are using our brand-new audio, video, and broadcast system for the first time. The Council had allocated money for this important purpose in both 2021 and 2022. Scott Stevens, the project manager, has been working with our vendor. The administration is to be commended for the work they have done in this regard.
- The Council meetings previously scheduled for June 22nd and July 6th will be held on June 29th.
- The Planning Board is expected to hear the Catalyst application at its June 13 meeting. A final hearing on the Catalyst Application will be conducted on June 29th.
- Attended the Memorial Day parade and ceremony in the Bradley Gardens on May 29th. This event was hosted by the American Legion Post 327.
- Attended the Somerset Patriots' 25th season anniversary celebration. This was a great event hosted by the Kalifer family.
- A special thanks to Linda Doyle and her staff for their great work on the primary elections. The elections have evolved, we now have early voting, new machines, and new procedures. Overall, it was certainly a success.

Mayor's Reports

Michael Pappas, Township Administrator reported on behalf of Mayor Moench

• On behalf of the administration, Administrator Pappas thanked Scott Stevens and others who made the transition to the new AV system possible and successful. The new system has two screens on the side that

can be swung to the side, depending on the size of the crowd, to give viewers a slightly better view.

 In terms of the Council agenda tonight, there are two more contract awards for our 2023 Road Program. Administrator Pappas stated we anticipate a very efficient road construction program this year, weather permitting.

Council President Kirsh stated a municipal budget reflects the values of the community we represent as elected officials. No budget is perfect, especially in

tough economic times; expenses are not always predictable. The budget that is presented is extremely prudent and responsible. We have been able to lower the tax rate and were able to spend \$47,214,775.68 for municipal operations and \$11,678,201 for sewer. Special recognition to Joe Sarno in his role as our Chief Financial Officer. It was he who presented a budget that we are now adopting.

Councilman Ring stated when this budget process started, there were four different opinions on what the budget should or should not look like. Overall, there were many compromises and this budget should serve the community very well.

Councilman Norgalis voiced that planning a budget is an arduous process, time-consuming, and very frustrating.

Councilman Pedroso stated he had served on the Budget and Finance Committee for many years noting that budgeting can be time-consuming. He offered, however, that he will continue to vote "no" on the budget because the amount that is being raised through taxation is beyond his comfort level. Councilman Pedroso stated that at this time, he would prefer to see more cuts in spending and also in non-essential services.

Administrator Pappas, on behalf of the Mayor and the administration, thanked the Council, as well as the Council Finance Committee for their tireless efforts. He also thanked CFO Sarno and our department heads who have been very patient during this process.

Council was in consensus in appreciating the work that went into preparing this budget and commended all involved in the process including the Mayor, Administrator, Finance, CFO, Budget Committee, and Council.

Public Comment

Members of the public wishing to address the Council on any matter will be allowed two minutes to speak unless there are unusual circumstances.

Jennifer Loughran, 716 Falcon Court

 Praised the community policing course and the ongoing relationships built with police officers. She reported that BK Skates is proud to support the 2nd annual Bike Rodeo event on June 24 with the Bridgewater Police Department. Council President Kirsh thanked Ms. Loughran for her participation.

These are not lifelong conditions but reviewed annually, and our client does not consent to continued special conditions on its liquor license, and we request removal. Certainly, there are town-wide noise ordinances and other municipal regulations and state laws that would govern our client that make the special conditions inappropriate, burdensome, and unnecessary."
